

BAPTIST ASSOC. CLOSED SESSIONS LAST NIGHT

Attitude of Provincial Govern-
ment Toward Prohibition Is
Commended—Resolu-
tion Passed.

The United Baptist Association of
New Brunswick closed its annual ses-
sion at Marysville last night.

Thursday Evening

Last night's session opened at 7.30
led by Rev. David Patterson. There
were also able and interesting address-
es by Rev. S. S. Poole, B. A. of St.
John and Rev. M. L. Orchard who had
spent some years in India.

The new moderator Rev. S. S.
Poole, B. A. was then introduced and
took charge of the meeting.

Resolutions

The following resolution was
passed. Resolved, that the thanks of
the association be extended to the
two Baptist Churches and to the peo-
ple of Marysville for their kindness
and to the choir for its excellent mus-
ic.

A resolution expressing approval
of the attitude of the Provincial Gov-
ernment in regard to the severe en-
forcement of the Prohibition Act es-
pecially of Premier Foster's attitude
as expressed in a letter to the Chief
Inspector assuring him that all fair
and practical improvements required
in the Act to make it more effective
would be made.

A resolution also was passed en-
dorsing the good work of the Chief
Inspector Wilson.

The resolution committee passed a
resolution in reference to the Bible
reading in the public schools and the
association expressed its view as
against the resolution passed at the
Maritime Association Convention at
Truro three years ago and wishes that
resolution rescinded.

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L.B.YOUNGHUSBAND DIED AT CALGARY FROM PNEUMONIA

SUPT. WORKS BRANCH
WELL KNOWN HERE

Represented M. H. C. in build-
ing of Convalescent Home
in Fredericton—Taken
Ill on Train.

I. B. Younghusband, superintendent
of the Works Branch, Military Hospi-
tals Commission who is well known in
Fredericton because of his connection
with the building of the Convalescent
Home in this city, died on Sunday
night last at Calgary. He was on his
way to Kamloops, B. C. to superintend
construction work and was taken with
pneumonia on the train. Mrs. Young-
husband who was with him also was
taken ill but will recover. Word of his
death has been received with great
regret by his many friends here.

The Ottawa Citizen has the follow-
ing:

After an illness of less than four
days while on his way with his wife
to Kamloops, to superintend the con-
struction of an addition to a sanitar-
ium there I. B. Younghusband, a well
known Ottawa man died on Sunday
night at a hospital in Calgary. The
late Mr. Younghusband was employed
for the last two years by the Military
Hospital Commission and two weeks
ago he left for Ottawa accompanied
by his wife to go to Kamloops. While
making the trip both contracted
pneumonia and on reaching Calgary
they were taken to a hospital there.
Mrs. Younghusband is reported to be
recovering.

The deceased was in his 34th year.
He was born at South March and for
the last sixteen years was well known
in Ottawa as a contractor. He was
also well known here socially, being
for a long time Noble Grand of Earns-
cliffe Lodge 283 I. O. O. F. and re-
cording secretary of the lodge for
nine terms. He was for a time District
Deputy Grand Master for the Ottawa
district and also Degree Master of
the Victoria Degree Lodge I. O. O. F.
and captain of the Degree team.

The late Mr. Younghusband was
also a member of the Masonic Lodge
Fidelity Lodge Number 231.

He will be buried with Masonic
honors at Ottawa. Besides his widow
he is survived by three brothers, H. B.
of Ottawa, J. V. on active service, V.
G. of Ottawa, and by four sisters,
Mrs. R. B. Stanley of Greely, Ontario,
the Misses Lillita and Hilda of Ot-
tawa and Miss Mae with Mrs. Young-
husband in Calgary.

Mrs. J. H. Staveley and family of
Fern Hill left last evening for Victoria
B. C. where they will reside in future.

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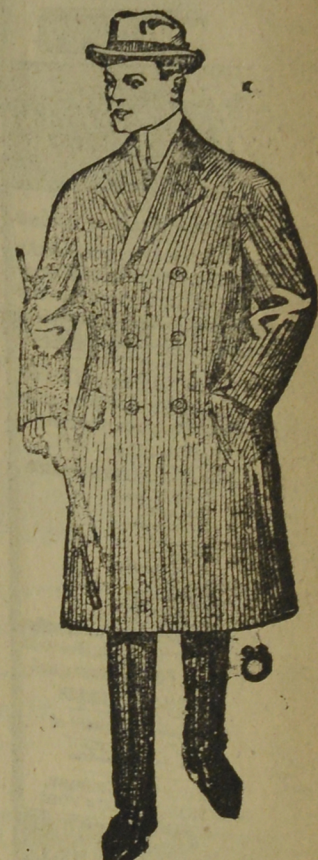

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FREIGHT BOAT ST. MICHIEL IS LAUNCHED

Toronto, Sept. 26.—The St. Michiel,
a new steel freighter built by the Do-
minion Shipbuilding Company, was
launched successfully here today. The
St. Michiel has been designed for trans-
Atlantic service, and is 261 feet in
length, has a gross carrying capacity
of 4,500 tons, and a speed of ten knots
an hour. The company announced that
five smaller vessels are to be built al-
most immediately.
