## THE GREAT WORLD WAR ENDED THIS MORNING

**Complete Capitulation of the Brutal Huns—Their Armies Trimmed to a Finish by the Allies—“Bill” Hohenzollern, Abandoned by His Alleged Partners, Vaults Over the Dyke Into Holland—Civilization and Democracy are Safe.**

Washington, Nov. 11—The world war ended at six o'clock this morning Washington time with red revolution in Germany and with William Hohenzollern, former emperor, a fugitive from his native land.

Announcement that the armistice terms imposed by the Allied and American governments had been signed by the German envoys at midnight last night, five o'clock Paris time, and that hostilities would cease six hours later, was made at the state department at 2.45 o'clock this morning.

Terms of the surrender of Germany were not made public coincident with this announcement, but they were to be given out later in the day. The momentous news of the ending of the war was given to newspaper correspondents by an official of the state department. He said: “The armistice has been signed. It was signed at 5 o'clock a. m., Paris time, and hostilities will cease at eleven o'clock this morning Paris time.”

Information that the armistice had been signed was transmitted to the White House after it was received by the government and President Wilson was expected to issue a statement to the American people today.

**Escaped to Holland**  
New York, Nov. 10—The Associated Press tonight issued the following: William Hohenzollern the abdicated German Emperor and King of Prussia and his eldest son, Frederick William who hoped some day to rule the German people are reported to have fled to Holland.

The revolution which is in progress throughout Germany although it seemingly is a peaceful one, probably threw fear into the hearts of the former Kaiser and the Crown Prince and caused them to take asylum in a neutral state.

William II, reigning king of the Monarchy of Wurttemberg, is declared to have abdicated on Friday night and reports have it that the Grand Duke of Hesse ruler of the Grand Duchy of Hesse has decreed the formation of a council of state to take over the government there. Swiss advices say that every dynasty in Germany is to be suppressed and all princes exiled.

**Marseillaise in Berlin**  
Peoples' governments have been established in the greater part of Berlin and in other cities of the Kingdom and Empire. Leipzig, Stuttgart, Cologne, Essen, and Frankfurt have joined the revolution. In Berlin there has been some fighting between the revolutionists and reactionaries in which several people were killed or wounded. The palace of the Crown Prince has been taken over by the revolutionists. “Long live the republic,” and the singing of “The Marseillaise” have been heard in the streets of Berlin.

Friedrich Ebert, the Socialist leader has been appointed imperial chancellor.

**Prisoners Released**  
Italian Headquarters in Italy, Nov. 11—More than a quarter of a million Italian prisoners in Austria have been returned to Italy. Sick and wounded men will be returned later by way of Switzerland. The repatriated soldiers say that violent conditions are not prevalent in Austria except for disorders due to hunger strikes.

They declare that the civil population desires heartily to see the return of their own men home. The soldiers in Austria are indifferent or else express happiness that the war is over.

Italian officers returning from Austria express the opinion that for the present there will be no disturbances in Austria like those in Russia.
