# THE VINDICTIVE WILL HAVE PLACE IN HISTORY

Glorious Achievement of the British Navy at Ostend is Praised by the London Press ---Intrepid Deed is Applauded on all Sides---The Casualties Were Not Heavy on the British Side---The German Submarine Campaign.

London, May 11.—The Vindictive's noble end is acclaimed by the newspapers as securing her a place in history for association with two of the most heroic deeds in naval annals. It is declared that Nelson never did anything finer and that if his ship, the Victory, is the cathedral of the navy, the Vindictive is the twentieth century witness of its fighting spirit.

Occasion is taken to pay tribute to the skill and devotion with which the navy secured a triumph of seapower in a manner unprecedented in the history of warfare. Deeds as intrepid and skilful as those now applauded are done daily and nightly, but the veil concealing the navy's work is rarely lifted.

### Casualties Not Heavy

London, May 12.—A Dover despatch says that the British casualties in the raid on Ostend were two officers and six men killed and two officers and eight men missing, supposed to have been killed. Of these, two officers and eight men were on the Vindictive. Five officers and twenty-four men were wounded of whom one officer and sixteen men were on the Vindictive.

### Mine-sweeper Sunk

London, May 12.—The admiralty announces that a British mine-sweeper sloop was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine on May 6. Two officers and thirteen men are missing and are presumed to have been drowned.

### The U-Boat Campaign

Amsterdam, May 11.—In a debate in the Reichstag today on the second reading of the naval estimates, as reported in a Berlin despatch, Herr Pfleger, Centrist, said on behalf of the main committee that even though there were differences of opinion regarding the political significance of the submarine warfare, the entire Reichstag was as one as regards its military achievements. All held the view that the U-boat campaign should not be given up or restricted in any way and that the construction of submarines should be promoted as far as possible. That was the opinion also, he said of the highest government officials and the army and navy commanders.

Vice-Admiral Von Capelle, minister of navy, stated that unrestricted U-boat warfare meant a very strong naval offensive against the Entente. "The reports for April are favorable he added. "Naturally losses occur, but the main thing is that the increase in submarines exceeds the losses. Our naval offensive is stronger today than at the beginning of unrestricted submarine warfare. That gives us an assured prospect of final success."

"The submarine warfare is developing more and more into a struggle between U-boat action and new construction of ships. Thus far the monthly figures of destruction have continued to be several times as large as those of new construction. Even the British ministry and the entire British press admit that. The latest appeal to British shipyard workers appears to be especially significant. For the present, apparently the appeal does not appear to have great success. According to the latest statement, British shipbuilding fell from 192,000 tons in March to 112,000 in April; or, reckoned in ships, from thirty-two to twenty-two."

ty-two. That means a decline of 80,000 tons, or about forty per cent. "America thus far has built little, and has fallen far below expectations. Even if an increase is to be reckoned in the future it will be used up completely by America herself.

"In addition to the sinkings by U-boats, there is a large decline in cargo space owing to marine losses and to ships becoming unserviceable. One of the best known big British ship-owners declared at a meeting of the shipping men that the losses of the British merchant fleet through marine accidents, owing to conditions created by the war, were three times as large as in peace."

superficial. The upward dimension is to the square what breadth is to the line. It is a multiplying factor. Symmetry requires height equal to length and breadth. The height of life is its religious consciousness, its upward reach, the divine within reaching toward the divine beyond.

### Upward Reach.

This upward reach is necessary to give effectiveness to life. Because of the absence of purpose sanctified by sympathy, many a life grows stagnant and corrupt, a veritable Dead Sea possessing neither life nor refreshing power. Because not fed from the Fount of God, many a stream of well intentioned effort goes dry and disappears in the desert sands. "But they that wait upon God renew their strength." The character that seeks the open reward must receive the secret nurture. The dependence which is to bring joy to the Christian heart and stay the soul in the time of trouble is not made in a day but is a gradual building Godward. Remember that, after all, the elevating power of the world is not talent, but character. Germany has taught us that learning without religion is perilous. If we would be great we first must be good.

### Words of Leaders.

In these days of "big battalions" we might for a moment listen to some of our illustrious leaders. General Horne says: "I have a firm belief in prayer as a support always and an inspiration often. I am convinced that prayer puts the finishing touch to our sense of duty and provides a stimulant that carries us through danger and difficulty."

General Allenby, who is winning conspicuous success in Palestine gives the following testimony: "We must bare our hearts before God. Then, purged of every base motive, we may go forward in high hope to the sure triumph awaiting us."

Admiral Beatty believes in his ships but believes more in his Pilot. He declares that "When England can look on the future with humbler eyes and a prayer on her lips then we can begin to count the days toward the end." And Sir William Robertson adds: "I fear even yet too many of us are putting an undue amount of trust in chariots and horses. . . A serious determination on the part of the nation to seek and deserve divine help would enable us to take a true perspective of the war."

Keep the window of your soul open towards heaven. Be often alone with God. Surround your whole life with the consciousness of the Divine presence and thus give height to life and perfect its proportions. To live forever as under the Great Taskmaster's eye is to be clothed with His power. To live in the atmosphere of the spiritual is to measure aright the material.

"And then God's greatness flows around our incompleteness. Around our restlessness His rest."

### Four-square Life.

This is the call of the four-square life; a noble purpose to realize one's highest possibilities, to enter into the life of the world in sympathetic service and to live in the love of God. And these are equal. To have length without breadth is to be cursed with selfishness; to have breadth without height is to be shallow; to have height without breadth is to be narrow. It was Disraeli I believe, who in a moment of cynicism said: "Youth is a blunder, manhood a struggle, old age a regret." But, no; not if we seek the four-square life constantly refreshed by the streams that descend
