Breadth of Sympathy.

2. All this is true; but when all is said that can be said it is only a line and life is more. Self-culture in itself is a very inadequate standard. To redeem it from the stagnation of selfishness the breadth of Sympathy must be added. Individualism is possible only at the peril of the individual. A life lost in self is only a line; there is length, but no breadth, tracing but no extension. The length must be equalled by the breadth. As the square is greater than the line so is the broad life greater than the selfish life. It is only when we square our life with our fellow men that we are true to the pattern on the Mount. Selfishness, however exalted, must be equalled by a world-wide sympathy or life becomes sordid. Focus your life then beyond yourself. One-half at least, of the law of God is that "you love your neighbor as yourself."

No one can live today regardless of the demands of the social life without loss of self-respect, and drying up of the very springs of inspiration. And never before were the calls to service so clear and claimant. The iron note of duty is awakening the most selfish. It is indeed a time of testing.

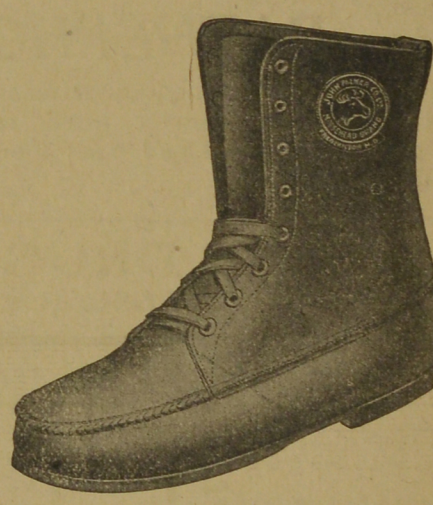
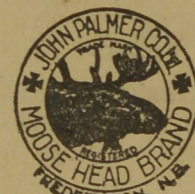
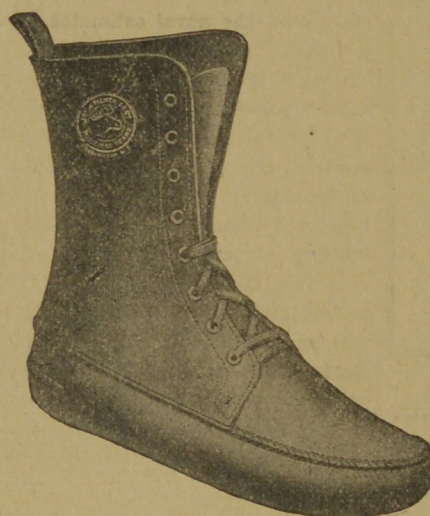
