## AUSTRO-HUNGARIAN TROOPS CATCHING IT GOOD AND HARD

Offering a Stubborn Resistance to Allied Forces on a Sixty Mile Front—Many Towns Liberated from Bondage—The Entire Enemy Front Apparently Broken—33,000 Prisoners and Large Numbers of Guns and Material Taken—Quiet on the Western Front.

New York, Oct. 30.—The Associated Press tonight issued the following:

Over a front of some sixty miles from the Brenta River in Northern Italy to the vicinity of the Adriatic Sea the Austro-Hungarians are being violently attacked by Italian, British French and American troops.

In the mountain region the enemy is resisting desperately and holding his ground fairly well, but east of the Piave River he is in flight across the plains of Treviso, shaping his course over the same territory through which he drove the Italians a year ago, and reached the eastern edge of the plains of Venetia.

Already numerous towns have been liberated, 33,000 prisoners have been taken and large numbers of guns and machine guns and huge quantities of stores have fallen into the hands of the Allied troops. Far behind the lines Allied aviators are heavily bombing enemy columns in dense masses which are in retreat over the badly congested roads leading eastward toward the Austrian frontier.

Judging the situation for the rapid advance the Allies are making it would appear that the entire enemy front has been broken east of the Piave and that with the cavalry operating far in advance of the foot troops the enemy forces will be unable to reform their battle line until the Austrian border is reached. It is not unlikely that many of the Austro-Hungarians are doomed to capture or extermination by the Allies.

### Quieter on Western Front

On the western front in France and Belgium there has been a marked diminution in the intensity of the infantry activity. Along the British line there have been only patrol encounters and reciprocal bombardments. The French, however, are engaged in another attack on a front of about seven and a half miles between St. Quentin Le Pittit and Herpy in the general direction of the enemy's communication lines running eastward from the old St. Quentin and Laon sectors and also with the purpose of driving a wedge into this part of the southern battle line and thereby compel the enemy to readjust his front through Champagne to the Meuse.

Around Grand Pre north of the Argonne Forest, the Americans have materially bettered their positions in attacks against the Germans. The Bellejoyeuse Farm, which for several days had been No Man's Land, now is virtually all held by the Americans. East of the Meuse there also has been considerable fighting but it has resulted in no great change in positions.

The big American guns are continuing to heavily shell the German positions far behind the lines and bombing planes also are intensively active against troop concentration points. In air fighting the Americans on Wednesday sent twenty-one German aviators crashing to the ground. Two of the American fliers are missing.

In both Serbia and Mesopotamia the Allied troops are still harassing the enemy. Serbian cavalry has arrived at the Danube, a short distance southeast of Belgrade. In Mesopotamia the British advance has proceeded 150 miles up the Tigris River from Bagdad.

ed the Allies to send their fleets into the Dardanelles and also to land a small detachment of troops to supervise the demobilization of the Turkish army.

### Allies in Agreement

Parsi Oct. 30.—6 p.m.—The heads of the Allied governments and Colonel E. M. House, special representative of the United States government with the military and naval advisers of the respective countries, continued their informal meetings today. Differences in view, natural to the immensity of the interests involved have arisen but under friendly examination they have largely disappeared.

Although some points in President Wilson's declarations may require more complete definition an entire agreement is in immediate prospect. The supreme war council will not meet formally until this full understanding has been reached.

the medal and asked that his congratulations be conveyed to Miss Wallace.

It was decided to request the Chief Superintendent of Education to formally present the medal to the winner at the Christmas closing exercises of the schools.

### Question of Scribblers

Some complaints lately reached the Board respecting the steadily increased cost of scribbles used in the schools. It was claimed that expense could be saved by using the slate more.

The matter was referred to the teachers for an expression of opinion and they were willing to restrict the use of scribbles if deemed wise, but the general thought was that these aids usually cost five cents and from two to four are all that are required for the year. Mr. Shute from the committee presented the views of the teachers as conveyed in writing. One teacher suggested camouflage for upon enquiry it was found that one mother who complained of the continual expense discovered, upon enquiry, that her boy was buying lolly-pops and going to the pictures instead of buying scribbles.

### Finish Courses

A letter was read from Dr. Foster calling attention to unjust criticism by a well known citizen to the effect that pupils in the Fredericton schools particularly in the High School, did not remain to finish their respective courses but drifted away to work. He claimed that this was not in accordance with facts, and submitted data to show that of pupils in the Fredericton schools, a greater proportion remained to finish their work than in several other cities which he named.

Reports were made by Mrs. Clark, Mr. Lemont, and Mr. Weddall, respecting registered pupils whose absence from lists was not accounted for by some of the teachers. A better check is hoped for in the future. After ordering the payment of a number of accounts the meeting adjourned.

### New Food Regulations

New food regulations from Ottawa and effective Friday, November 1, provide that after that date substitutes for wheat flour shall mean pure and wholesome oat flour, barley flour, corn flour and rye flour. The order allows persons in towns and cities to have in their possession 100 pounds of wheat flour or not more than they require for sixty days. Furthermore, residents in out of the way districts such as places isolated on account of closed navigation may have in their possession supplies of flour and sugar for 200 days. The order also prohibits the feeding of wheat products, except bran and shorts, to live stock or poultry.

### End of Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the Province of New Brunswick closes today. Under the terms of the Audit Act of last session, all municipalities, departments of government and public institutions having relations with the province have thirty days in which to submit accounts chargeable to the year 1918.

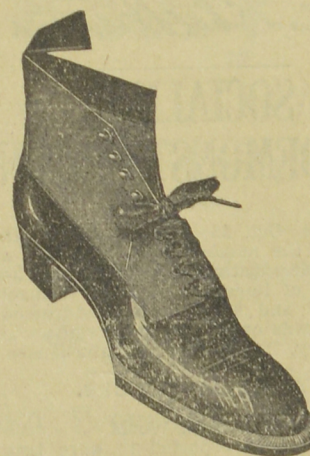
