## OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

### MIDWINTER RECIPES.

#### Parsnip Soup.

For parsnip soup, boil three washed and pared parsnips until tender. Then put them through a sieve and return to the water in which they were boiled. There should be just enough to cover them. Add the same quantity of milk. Season with salt and pepper, and to each pint of milk add two tablespoonfuls of flour rubbed smooth in a little cold milk. Cook until the mixture is smooth. Serve with croutons and minced parsley.

#### Salmon Sandwiches.

Cut rye bread in thin slices and butter half of them. On the other half, spread canned salmon freed from skin and bone, and mashed to a paste with mayonnaise. Then add a little shredded lettuce and then the slices of buttered bread.

#### Boiled Tongue.

Boil a tongue until it is tender, then remove the skin and serve in rather thick slices in tomato sauce, well seasoned. To make the tomato sauce, cook half a chopped sweet green pepper and a small onion, chopped, in two tablespoonfuls of bacon fat, without browning them, for a few moments. Then add another tablespoon of fat, and when it is bubbling, add two tablespoonfuls of flour. Stir, and gradually add a cup of tomato juice. Strain when thoroughly cooked.

#### Currant Buns.

Rub a quarter of a cup of butter substitute into two cups of flour. Add a cup of warm milk in which half of a yeastcake has been dissolved, and two tablespoonfuls of sugar. Mix thoroughly and place in a warm place to rise. When it has risen add two ounces of cleaned currants, form in eight or ten buns, brush with beaten egg, let rise and bake.

#### Old English Plum Pudding.

Mix half a pound of flour, one cupful of honey, chopped suet and bread crumbs, with the grated rind of half a lemon, one teaspoonful of chopped candied orange peel, a little nutmeg, a pinch of salt, half a cupful each of raisins and currants, and four well beaten eggs. Divide into individual molds and steam six or seven hours.

#### Economy Pudding.

One half-pound of mincemeat, two large apples sliced, half a cup of raisins, 1 cup bread crumbs, sugar. Soak mincemeat in hot water, add other ingredients, enough water to cover, and bake in casserole about one hour.
