had referred to the fact that pay sheets contained no dates of day's work for the public works department. That was true. He had become minister of public works on the 4th of April and had had to use the pay sheets which had been ordered by his predecessor for the year's work. Those pay sheets like those which had been used for years before contained no column for dates of day's work on the roads. But in this very matter he had forestalled his hon. friend and for ten days there had been in the hands of the printer copy for a new pay sheet which would show not only the dates for day's work but the actual number of hours. It was a new departure. He had found that the old pay sheet had left a chance for fraud in this particular and he had changed it for a pay sheet which would furnish all required information.

The hon. member for Carleton (Sutton) in his reference to the public works department had been a little fairer than other members of the opposition. That hon. member had stated that he had found good work on the roads but no permanent work. The hon. members of the House would remember that at the preceding session no interpretation had been placed on the word "permanent" but he had explained to the House the nature of the work intended. The speaker quoted from the report of the speech of the ex-attorney general concerning that matter to the effect that "anything that would improve drainage deserved a bond issue." The hon. member from St. John (Mr. Potts) in a speech on the same subject had said that there was no such thing as a permanent road and that the lives of roads varied. The ex-minister of public works had issued his famous manifesto to the electors for he had not

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been content to have his leader issue a manifesto; he had to toot his own horn for no one else would. He was not afraid of the French then for he had had that manifesto translated into French and published at a cost of \$100. The ex-minister had informed the public by that manifesto that he wished to use a half million bond issue to purchase improved machinery to build gravel roads, to provide ditching and to install concrete and arch culverts.

MR. SMITH (Carleton)—"That was right. That was honest."



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HON. MR. VENIOT—"Then why blame me for doing the same thing? It was all right for you to propose to spend \$500,000 in that way but it is wrong for me to do it."

Hon. members opposite had blamed him for making expenditures for skirting roads although his hon. friend the ex-minister had prepared to do the very same thing.

MR. POTTS said he would like to tell the minister of public works that the statement he had made was that he had been informed that the hon. minister had used the patronage of his office in the last Dominion election. He had something to say further.

HON. MR. VENIOT said he must take a point of order. The hon. gentleman had made a statement that he had been informed that such was the case and he could not go on and make a further statement. The rules of the House must be observed.

HON. MR. SPEAKER—"The statement must be withdrawn or must be allowed to stand."

MR. POTTS—"Perhaps you are afraid to hear the rest of it."

HON. MR. VENIOT said he was satisfied with the statement as it was made by the hon. member. He wished to devote some attention to remarks made by the hon. member for Charlotte (Cupitt) the new minister of marine and fisheries. He hoped that in the new government which the hon. gentlemen opposite were intending to form they would give him that portfolio. He had asked the hon. gentleman what had been the ordinary expenditure on roads in the island of Grand Manan but he had not replied to the question, evidently wishing to leave the impression that \$50.50 on permanent work was all that had been expended on the island. As a matter of fact upwards of \$2,000 had been expended there on ordinary road work. The hon. member for York (Young) had attempted practically the same forgetting to tell the House that \$2,400 had been spent in the parish of St. Mary's on ordinary road work. The hon. members were not lying but they came so close to it that there was little difference.

MR. YOUNG—"Can you tell us how much of that amount was spent in the village of St. Mary's?"

HON. MR. VENIOT—"From memory I cannot."

HON. MR. VENIOT continuing said his hon. friends opposite while in power had vaunted their much-talked-

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of Audit Act stating that nothing under it could be held back at the end of the fiscal year. On the hustings he had charged that the former administration did not show everything at the end of each year. He had said so in a joint debate with the ex-provincial secretary at Memramcook and regretted that that gentleman did not have a seat in the House so that he could say it to him again. From 1912 to 1916 there was not a year in which accounts received in time were not carried over. He had the original requisitions in the department of public works which would show that such
