

DISTRIBUTION OF SEED GRAIN, 1918

GOOD SEED IS SCARCE. Place your order now, with your County Council. The Department of Agriculture has ordered 56,000 bushels of oats and 10,000 bushels of wheat.

Oats will be sold for \$1.32 per bushel, in bulk car lots, or \$1.38 in bags in car lots laid down.

Wheat will be sold for \$3.00 per bushel, in bags car lots or f. o. b., distribution point for smaller orders.

Local freights will be paid by purchaser. County Councillors and Agricultural Societies should place car lot orders immediately, stating destination for cars. Delivery not guaranteed unless orders placed within three weeks, because of transportation difficulties.

GOOD SPEECHES DELIVERED AT LEGISLATIVE OPENING

Dr. Hetherington of Queens and Mr. J. E. Michaud of Madawaska, Cordially Endorsed Government's Legislative Program--Campaign for Increased Production is Heartily Approved--The Opposition Leader Moved the Adjournment of the Debate.

Although stripped of some of the spectacular features, the ceremony at the opening of the Legislature yesterday afternoon proved to be a most interesting one. There was a very large attendance of spectators, the galleries being thronged and all the available space on the floor of the House was taken up. Mrs. Pugsley, wife of the Lieutenant Governor, occupied a seat to the left of the Speaker's dais in company with the Earl and Countess of Ashburnham. The wives of members of the Executive occupied adjoining seats. The opening ceremony lasted about fifteen minutes and when the Governor and party withdrew, the House got right down to business.

Premier Foster introduced a bill, which was read a first time. Dr. Hetherington, who moved the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, spoke about twenty minutes. He was followed by Mr. Michaud, who also spoke briefly.

Mr. Murray, the opposition leader, moved the adjournment of the debate, which was made the order of the day for this afternoon.

The address in reply to the Speech from the Throne which was moved by Dr. J. E. Hetherington of Queens and seconded by Mr. J. E. Michaud of Madawaska, was as follows:

To His Honor The Honorable William Pugsley, D. C. L., K. C., P. C., Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Brunswick:

May it please His Honor:—We, His Majesty's most faithful subjects of the Legislative Assembly

of the Province of New Brunswick, now in session, beg leave to extend our humble thanks to His Honor for the gracious speech which His Honor has addressed to us, and we heartily reciprocate the feelings of pleasure with which Your Honor greeted us at this the second session of the seventh Legislative Assembly of this Province.

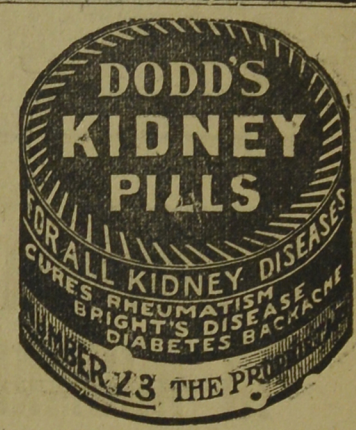
Dr. Hetherington

DR. HETHERINGTON, in rising to move the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, said: I must beg the indulgence of the hon. members of the House because of my limitations as a public speaker and the brevity of my experience as a member. I hardly know who exhibited the greater courage, the Premier when he did me the honor to invite me to move the address, or I when I displayed the temerity to undertake it.

Since the House last met the Province has sustained a very great loss in the death of Lieut. Governor Gilbert B. Ganong and each and every member will unite in the sentiments of regret as expressed in His Honor's speech and in extending our sincerest sympathy to his family in their sad and irreparable loss.

The New Governor.

The choice of one who for many years was a prominent member of this House for the post of Lieut. Governor thus made vacant fills us with the keenest satisfaction, and we feel that the province may well congratulate itself upon the appointment of a governor who brings to this high office so much of dignity and accomplishment and well-rounded experience. I think I must voice a unanimous



sentiment when I say that no selection could have been more acceptable to our people and more in accord with their ideals and conception of the requirements of this honorable office.
