

WIN-THE-WAR RECIPES.

These recipes are issued by the
Fredericton Food Control Committee.

Salmon Loaf.

1 cup salmon (cold, boiled)
2 eggs,
½ cup bread crumbs,
1 tablespoon butter,
¼ teaspoon salt,
¼ teaspoon pepper,
1 tablespoon minced parsley.
A little grated onion if liked.

Bone and mince the fish, add the
crumbs, butter and seasoning and eggs
slightly beaten. If too dry, a little
milk may be added. Put in a buttered
mould and steam three-quarters of
an hour. Turn out and serve with a
white sauce. Canned salmon may be
used or any other cold boiled fish.

Brown Bread.

Two-thirds cup of cornmeal, scalded
to a medium consistency with 2½
cups of boiling water,
Two-thirds cup of molasses,
1 dessert spoon of salt,
1 tablespoon of butter,
¾ yeast cake dissolved in half cup
of lukewarm water,
1 quart of wheat flour.

Allow scalded cornmeal to become
lukewarm, add molasses, salt and but-
ter; add flour and knead well (a little
more flour can be added if necessary).
Let rise over night. Put in pans in
the morning and let rise till nearly
double in bulk. Bake one hour in a
moderately hot oven. This recipe
makes two loaves.

Graham Pudding.

¼ cup butter,
½ cup molasses,
½ cup milk,
1 egg,
1½ cups graham flour,
½ teaspoon soda,
1 teaspoon salt,
1 cup raisins, seeded and cut.

Melt butter, add molasses, milk, egg
well beaten, dry ingredients mixed and
sifted, and raisins. Turn into buttered
mold, cover on steam two and one-
half hours. Serve with hard sauce, or
any preferred sauce. Dates or figs cut
in small pieces may be used in place of
raisins.

MUCH CREDIT DUE REDMOND.

London, Mar. 7. — The death of
John Redmond at the moment when
the convention which is to settle the
future of Ireland is having its most
momentous sessions, is considered in
political circles to be almost a disaster.
During the weeks in which the
Irish convention has been busy try-
ing to find a solution to the Irish
problem, to which he gave his life, Mr.
Redmond exercised a great moderat-
ing influence and if, as despatches
from Dublin say, there is a prospect
of agreement, he must be given a
great measure of credit for this state
of affairs.

Act to incorporate the New Brunswick
Western Railway Company, with a
capital stock of \$400,000.00, with power

dantic and Pokok and a point in the
Parish of North Lake in the said
County at or near the head of North
Lake, being on the international bound-
ary between the United States of Amer-
ica and the Dominion of Canada, and
there to connect with the Eastern
Maine Railroad chartered by the Leg-
islature of the State of Maine, with all
the usual powers incidental thereto,
and with authority to acquire by pur-
chase or otherwise, and own, operate
and sell hydro-electric power and en-
ergy for all purposes.

CITY ELECTION

The Election for Mayor and for Al-
dermen for the City of Fredericton for
the ensuing year will be held on
**Monday, the 11th Day of
March, 1918,**

At the Polling Places as follows:
Division No. 1.—For all voters resid-
ing or owning property above the
northwest centre line of Carleton
street prolonged, at or near the City
Hall, in the said city.

Division No. 2.—For all voters resid-
ing or owning property in the remain-
der of the said City, at or near the
County Court House in the said City.

Nominations.

Every Candidate for the office of
Mayor or Alderman shall be qualified
to vote at the election for which he is
nominated, and shall be nominated in
writing by at least TWO ratepayers
residing in the City of Fredericton,
and qualified to vote at the ensuing
election for which such Candidate is
nominated.

Every nomination paper with the
certificate of the City Treasurer shall
be filed with the City Clerk or at his
office and not later than Four o'clock
on the afternoon of MONDAY, the 4th
day of March, 1918, and the City Clerk
before receiving such nomination
paper shall ascertain from the same that
the requirements of the Election Act
have been complied with.

No Candidate is qualified to be nomi-
nated for Alderman unless at the time
of nomination he is a resident of the
Ward for which he is nominated.

The acceptance of each candidate
and the signatures of at least TWO
resident qualified voters, who must
sign the nomination paper, shall be
proved by a witness by affidavit attached
to the nomination.

In case of a contest, each elector
shall be entitled to vote for ONE can-
didate for Mayor, for ONE candidate
for Alderman for Wellington Ward,
for ONE candidate for Alderman for
St. Ann's Ward, for ONE candidate for
Alderman for Carleton Ward, for ONE
candidate for Alderman for Queen's
Ward, and for ONE candidate for Al-
derman for Kings Ward.
