## ST. QUENTIN AND CAMBRAI WILL SOON BE ENVELOPED

### Allied Forces Are Fast Closing in on Enemy Strongholds --- More Than 10,000 Prisoners and Forty Large Guns Have Been Captured---Huns Counter Attacking Vigorously Northeast of Soissons

New York, Sept. 19.—The Associated Press tonight issues the following: Thursday saw both the British and French armies in Picardy materially develop their plans for the enveloping of St. Quentin and Cambrai. The British made further gains around Gouzeaucourt and east of Epehy, while the French striking southeast of St. Quentin brought the southern part of their nippers into a still better position for the squeeze against the town which daily seemingly is growing nearer. More than 10,000 prisoners and in excess of 60 large guns fell into the hands of the British during the big operation begun by Field Marshal Haig Wednesday northwest of St. Quentin. In addition, extremely heavy casualties were inflicted on the Germans in the frontal attacks and during violent counter attacks made by them in an endeavor to recover their losses of ground. So badly was the enemy hammered during this fighting that he did not attempt on Thursday to stir from his trenches, except near Epehy and Gouzeaucourt and to give listless battle on isolated sectors to the front.

#### Frantic Counter Attacks

Northeast of Soissons the Germans are counter-attacking viciously against the allied forces holding strategic positions which are threatening the high ground along the Chemin Des Dames, which the enemy hopes to save as a temporary haven of refuge in the event of a forced retirement from the west and the south. Notwithstanding the strength of the onslaught the French everywhere repulsed the enemy.

Likewise south of the Aisne in the region of Courland the Germans endeavored to beat back the French, but again were met with defeat, the French artillery cutting the attacking waves to pieces.

On the Lorraine front there has been considerable mutual artillery shelling, but no big infantry engagement. A raid attempted by the Germans against General Pershing's men northwest of Pont-A-Mousson came to naught.

#### Bulgarians on Run

In the Macedonia theatre the Bulgarians are still in full flight before the Serbians, who have recaptured numerous towns, taken large numbers of prisoners and great quantities of war stores. Following the usual tactics of the Teutonic allies, the enemy is devastating the country he traverses, leaving it a wilderness through the use of the torch and explosives.

In European Russia the Bolsheviks and the Germans for the moment seem to have the upper hand over the Czech-Slovaks, who have been compelled to evacuate Volsk, Simbirsk and Kazan. The success of the enemy forces is attributed to a lack of ammunition and other supplies by the Czech-Slovaks. In Trans-Caucasia the British force which recently went to the relief of the besieged Armenians in Baku has been compelled to withdraw into north Persia in the face of large forces and the ineffectiveness of the Russo-Armenian aid.

#### Have 10,000 Prisoners

London, Sept. 19.—The prisoners taken by the British in the operations begun Wednesday northwest of St. Quentin now exceed 10,000 according

to Field Marshal Haig's communication tonight. More than sixty guns were taken. Most of the fighting today was around Gouzeaucourt and to the east of Epehy.

"Further reports confirm the heavy nature of the counter-attack which the enemy delivered yesterday afternoon north of Trescault and the severity of the losses inflicted on his divisions, including the sixth Brandenburg division.

"Fighting has taken place today in the sector east of Epehy and also in the neighborhood of Gouzeaucourt, where we gained ground north of Gauche Wood. On the remainder of the battle front only local engagements are reported."

## GEE WHIZZ! AND IRELAND SO FAR AWAY

London, Sept. 19.—Although only a three-hour boat trip separates England and Ireland, there is as much difference as between day and night in the two islands as far as food is concerned.

For the person who has lived in England for a time and whose habits have let him believe his system needs more than the number of food calories science prescribes Ireland is a wonderful place to dine in.

It does not follow that sufficient food is not available in England—there is sufficient to healthily maintain the system, but there is a difference between that and eating a large steak properly decorated. That can be accomplished in Ireland at reasonable prices, but not in England at any price.

Ireland is not rationed voluntarily or otherwise, and there is plenty of everything, with the exception of sugar. In respect to food, it is more pleasantly situated than the United States or England, because prices have not advanced as they have in America and are no higher than in England, where the ministry of food not only rations but controls prices.

#### Aged Man Injured

An aged man residing in South Devon was struck by a motor car near the Devon end of the highway bridge last evening shortly before six o'clock and was knocked down. He was taken to his home in a car. A collision between two cars occurred at the same time.

#### Coal Shortage Very Serious

Mr. R. H. Simonds Fuel Controller for the city of Fredericton and surrounding districts received a letter from Mr. J. H. Frink, Fuel Administrator for the Province stating that he did not expect that the 8,000 tons of coal which were optioned to the city of Fredericton and districts would be all obtained. He stated that the whole matter of Anthracite as far as exports from the United States was concerned would be greatly involved. He also asked Mr. Simonds to impress strongly the need of using wood and soft coal as a substitute for Anthracite in case the apportionment of coal did not materialize.
