WAYS TO COOK RICE.

Rice Pancakes.

One cup boiled rice, 1 cup flour, a
quarter cup cornstarch, half teaspoon
salt, 1 heaping teaspoon baking pow-
der, 1 egg, 1 cup milk. Sift the dry
ingredients together, soak the rice in
the milk, add the well beaten egg, stir
all together and add more milk to
make a thin batter. Bake on hot grid-
dles.

Rice Crumpets.

Stir into one and a half cupfuls of
sweet milk 1 tablespoonful of melted
fat, 3 eggs, beaten thoroughly and one
cupful of rice boiled until quite dry.
Mix together 1 cupful of cornmeal,
a half cupful of flour and 2 tablepoon-
fuls of baking powder and 1 tablepoon-
ful of salt. Combine the flour with the
rice and liquid mixture, beat and bake
quickly on a hot greased griddle.

Rice Compote.

Wash two-thirds cupful rice and
cook in three cupfuls boiling water,
until water is absorbed. Add one-third
cupful hot milk, one-half cupful sugar
and one teaspoonful salt. When rice
is soft but not broken, turn into a
greased or oiled mold. When cold,
remove to serving dish and ornament
with halves of canned fruit. A thin
boiled custard may be served if de-
sired.

Boiled Rice.

Into three quarts of boiling water
put a teaspoon of salt, wash a cupful
of rice and sprinkle the rice in the
water so gradually as not to stop the
boiling. When all in, give the water
a swirl with a fork, cover and boil
rapidly 20 minutes without stirring.
Place the colander on a tin dish, stand
in the oven for five minutes to dry,
leaving the door wide open, then turn
it carefully into a heated dish. Serve
without cover. The rapid boiling al-
lows each grain to swell to three times
its normal size and the motion pre-
vents the grains from sticking to-
gether. Do not stir, as this will cause
it to fall to the bottom and burn. The
drying in the oven with the door open
evaporates the rice soft, snowy white
and perfectly dry.

VICTORY CABBAGE.

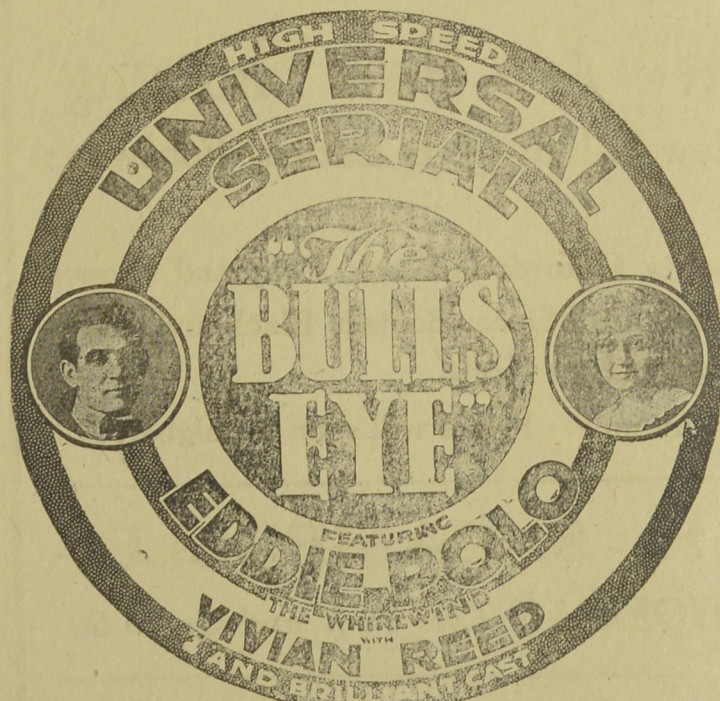
Slice cabbage and soak in cold wa-
ter; put one quart of cabbage in a
stewpan with two tablepoonfuls of
butter or butter substitute, one-half
teaspoonful of salt, one tablepoonful
of finely chopped onions, a few grat-
ings of nutmeg and a few grains of
cayenne. Cover and cook until cab-
bage is tender. Add two tablepoons
of vinegar and cook five minutes.

BIG LOSSES FROM DISEASE IN POULTRY

At least fifty per cent of the chick-
ens, young ducks and turkeys, and ten
per cent of the adult birds, die each
year from diseases, many of which are
preventable. This is an annual nation-
al loss of probably millions of dol-
lars that should be avoided to a large
extent.

War conditions make it imperative
that farmers and poultrymen as far
as possible should stop this enormous
leak. To do this every breeder should
pay strict attention to the general
conditions of his flock. When anything
unusual is noted in a fowl, it is ad-
visable to place the affected individual
in separate quarters. If within a short
time recovery does not take place, it
is unwise to destroy the fowl without
first ascertaining the cause of the
disorder. The prevalence of disease
is more often the cause of failure than
the lack of practical knowledge and
the extreme importance of keeping
the quarters clean; isolation of all
ailing fowls and immediate action in
regard to finding out the cause can-
not be too strongly impressed upon
the poultryman.

When trouble occurs, forward to the
Biological Laboratory, Central Exper-

imental Farm, Ottawa, Ont., a live but
sick fowl, or, in the absence of such,
a dead bird. In the interval disinfect
the quarters, runs, drinking fountains
and feed dishes to check the spread
of any infectious disease.

Disinfect the poultry houses by
spraying the interior with a lime-
wash solution (50 lbs. stone lime
slaked in a barrel of water plus one
gallon of a good commercial disin-
fectant). Fill cracks and crevices to
destroy mites, lice, etc. If a smaller
amount is required it may be prepar-
ed by adding two and half pounds of
lime to a pail of water plus half a tea-
cupful of disinfectant.

Keep a crop growing in some part
of the yards and alternate poultry
and crops. If the runs are small cover
with a coating of air-slaked lime
and dig up. If the runs are too large
to dig, plough and cultivate before
sowing. Rape is a good crop for this
purpose. Rear all chicks on fresh soil.

Although these precautions may ap-
pear unnecessary it is the only way of
combating many disease conditions
affecting poultry, which if left to them-
selves will undoubtedly prove decid-
edly costly in the long run.
