

SAYS GERMAN PRISONERS ARE WELL LOOKED AFTER

Moncton Newspaper Claims Men in Internment Camps Get Much Better Treatment Than Do Our Boys in Captivity in Germany—Extravagance is Charged—Fountain Pens and Tennis Shoes Provided for Huns in the Prison Camp at Amherst, N. S.

Mr. Carvell told us in one of his Western speeches that in the future taxes would be higher than ever before.

This journal does not question for one moment the accuracy of this statement but fears that it is, if possible, rather under than over-stated.

If taxes, however were alone levied for the purpose of maintaining Canada's position in upholding a righteous cause there would be no complaint. For the cause for which Canada is fighting no taxation ever levied could be really burdensome, considering the price we would have to pay should we fail in maintaining the cause.

The revelations made respecting the extravagance in the Amherst internment camp, in feeding the German war prisoners, when those of our own boys overseas, unfortunately captured are being scourged and whipped starved and punished, bitten by dogs or even shot for the least complaint, are facts which stir the blood of loyal English people in indignation against the government's mismanagement in connection with the Amherst Internment Camp.

In the Auditor General's report, as already stated on Saturday it appears that fountain pens were purchased and charged to the Amherst Internment Camp at \$5.00 each in one case and at prices slightly lower in others, but now it appears that the authorities also purchased for these German prisoners of war sixteen pairs of tennis shoes.

These too were charged to the people of Canada in this war camp.

The Unionist orators are asked to explain to the outraged people of this country how many pairs of tennis shoes they think the Kaiser bought for the Canadian prisoners of war, now in Germany. Treat the German prisoners fairly, feed them reasonably but shut out the war profiteer just as sharply as you should intern the enemy alien.

Let us put in brief a few of the facts brought out on Saturday respecting the Amherst Internment Camp, and these facts, as stated in the Auditor General's report, refer only to the fiscal year, ending on

Besides the sauerkraut first by the barrel and then by the ton the head-cheese and the macaroni and the sausages and the other little dainties, even including veal, here are a few of the items, reproduced so that the people may note them:

At the time when the government was asking the people of Canada to save beef, because of the beef famine 312,164 lbs of beef were bought for this camp, 7,800 lbs of fresh pork and pork chops, 1,790 lbs of sausages, 245 lbs of ham and to cap the climax 49,961 lbs of bacon!

The government is today commandeering creamery butter entirely for overseas consumption, presumably for the boys overseas, and the latter are gladly welcome to it. The people of Canada will not complain one iota if our boys get the creamery butter. We will take the other, but when as a people we are asked to do without creamery butter and we find that thousands and thousands of pounds of creamery butter were supplied in 1916-17 to the German prisoners in the camp at Amherst, it is time to complain. The total quantity of butter of all grades supplied to this one camp in the year named was 53,355 lbs.

One Amherst firm alone out of this total of 53,355 lbs. of butter of all grades, supplied 15,713 lbs., which it classified as creamery butter, sold to the camp at prices ranging from 32 to 42 cents per pound.

Classified as dairy butter, the same firm supplied 21,299 lbs. at prices ranging from 28 cents to 35 cents, about one half being at the latter price.

This, remember, was a year ago, and the butter was being sold at wholesale rates.

Jam was supplied to the stupendous total of 32,633 lbs., and 1,235 lbs. of this total was sold at the price of 45 cents a lb. The balance of it averaged in prices in the cheaper grades anywhere from 9 to 14 cents a lb.

No less than 10,000 lbs. of coffee and 7,601 lbs. of tea were supplied.

Then as a staple food we find there were 30,120 lbs. of beans.

Canada is willing to give millions to stand by the Empire's cause and for the war to uphold civilization. It is willing to tax itself in the future to give ample and generous pensions to those who have gone overseas to uphold the flag. It should provide special pensions for those who have had the misfortune of being imprisoned in German war camps and suffered the tortures of hell therein, but there should be nothing but condemnation and censure for this riotous extravagance in feeding the German war prisoners in this country when our own boys in the German camps overseas are suffering untold distress.

ROOSEVELT REPLIES TO PRESIDENT

New York, Oct. 29—Col. Theodore Roosevelt, answering President Wilson's appeal for return of a Democratic majority in congress, urged voters of the nation, in an address here last night, to transfer control to Republican leadership. Such an outcome of the election, he declared, would assure "our allies that America is determined to speed up this war and insist upon unconditional surrender, of the enemy and would serve notice on Germany and her vassal states that they would have to deal henceforth with the resolute and straightforward soul of the American people and not merely with the obscure purposes and wavering will of Mr. Wilson."

Declaring that half the leaders of the President's own party opposed him when he had committed himself to war measures, Mr. Roosevelt asserted the heads of the Republican organization in Congress supported the administration when a declaration of war was made; when there was a demand for the draft, when the army was sent overseas and when money was required by taxation or loans.

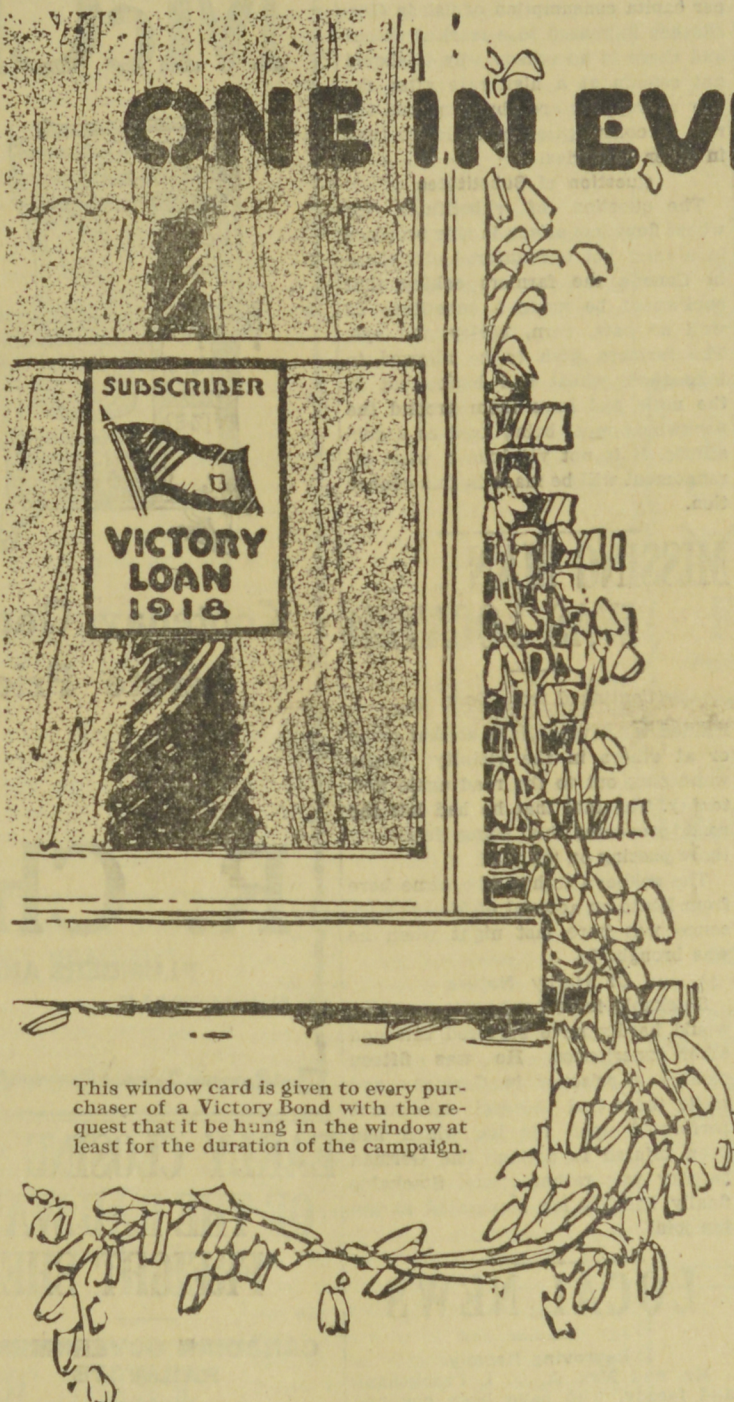
