Keeping House Without a Maid Has

there are in the way of household

aluminum ware. Cooking utensils of
aluminum are so much easier to keep
clean that they cannot be compared
to the old utensils. And food tastes so
much better cooked in aluminum.Then come the electrical appliances,
of which there are any number. And
glass oven-ware. "Exit the maid" will
have only joy for you if you use all
the helps that are yours to command.

HELPS FOR THE HOUSEWIFE.

A burned saucepan should be filled
with cold water, to which a liberal al-
lowance of soda has been added. Let
it stand for an hour or so, after which
heat the water slowly for a few min-
utes and the burned particles will
come off quite easily.Graham crackers put together sand-
wich style with mocha filling make an
excellent addition to the school lunch
box. Mocha filling is made as follows:
One cup of confectioners' sugar, two
teaspoons of cocoa, butter size of a
walnut moisten with hot coffee, beat
thoroughly and add a little vanilla.Save all the crumbs or pieces of
cake or cookies. When there is suffi-
cient quantity to thicken a quart of
milk, put in a pudding dish in layers,
turn in the milk (do not stir), and
bake one hour in a slow oven. Neither
egg, sugar nor flavoring is needed.
Serve hot with butter or sauce.Cover the bottom of a bean pot with
diced salt pork and add one sliced
onion. Nearly fill the pot with cubes
of rare or raw beef, add one table-
spoon of horseradish and a dash of
cayenne cover with boiling water and
cook several hours in a slow oven.

CARE OF THE HANDS.

slightest dampness of the skin in cold
weather will make the hands chap and
crack.Hot water should not be used more
than once a day at most for washing
the hands and then they should be
