

EPIDEMIC IS NOW DEFINITELY WANING IN CITY

STATEMENT WILL BE
ISSUED LAST OF WEEK

Assistant Physician Required
at Keswick—Situation on
Devon Indian Reserve
Improving.

The Fredericton Board of Health stated definitely this morning that the epidemic of influenza in this city is on the wane. Up to noon today the total number of cases reported was 535. In that number 87 developed into pneumonia. No deaths have occurred from pneumonia since yesterday morning. The reports of the physicians indicate that the number of new cases of influenza is diminishing. The total however will run well over six hundred. By the end of the week the Board of Health will be able to prepare a list which will approximate the number of convalescent cases still under treatment.

Physician for Keswick District

Dr. O. E. Morehouse, ex-M. P. P. of Upper Keswick who has been working hard in connection with the epidemic in that section asked today for an assistant. Dr. McIntyre who is connected with the military hospital here probably will be sent there to assist.

Deaths Among Indians

Indian Agent B. J. Griffiths has been informed that two deaths from influenza have occurred among the Indians at Kingsclear Kathryn Paul aged ten years daughter of Mrs. Louis Paul died and at Oromocto the daughter of Joseph Acquin aged twelve years also died. Among the Indians near Woodstock the situation is improving but the attending physician himself is ill. The Oromocto Reserve has about thirty cases of influenza some of which have developed into pneumonia. At the Devon Reserve there is a general improvement in all cases except that of Joseph Sacobie.

Unfortunate Case

There was an unfortunate case at the home of Herbert Mitchell Miramichi Road yesterday. The entire family is ill and Mrs. Mitchell died in the morning. It was late in the afternoon before it became known that she was dead and arrangement for burial was made.

Civil Court Adjourned

The Civil Court met this morning there being several matters to come before it but was adjourned for a week.

Condition Unchanged

The condition of Mr. John Kilburn who had a stroke of paralysis yesterday, is reported today to be unchanged.

Inspector Fleming on Duty

Mr. A. C. Fleming Health Inspector for the city, who was laid up by an attack of influenza for some days is able to be about again.

Out on Deposit

One drunk was arrested yesterday afternoon for being under the influence of lemon and vanilla extract. After making a deposit of \$8 he was allowed to go.

Walter B. Harris of Rooth and Edith L. Wood of French Lake were united in marriage by Rev. G. C. Warren yesterday afternoon at the Brunswick Street Baptist Parsonage.

Police Magistrate Walter Limerick who has been confined to his house for three weeks with la grippe is sufficiently recovered to be able to attend his office today.

Got a Fine Deer

Mr. Percy Day of this city formerly in the postal service succeeded in getting a fine deer at Mauderville a short time ago. Mr. Day reports the deer in that section as being numerous.

Chinese Partnership

Hop Lee and Hum Ton of St. John have entered into a copartnership under the name of Hop Lee & Company to carry on a business as importers of Chinese goods in the premises now occupied by Hop Lee and Tom Lee.

Private P. Howe Wounded

The casualty list includes the name of Private Percy Howe of St. Mary's (Devon) as wounded. Private Howe enlisted and left here with the 104th Battalion in 1916. He was transferred to the Mounted Rifles with which he served in France.

Waiting For Dates

The Gladys Klark Company and the W. S. Harkins Company have written for dates early in December at the Fredericton Opera House. The completion of the heating plant will determine the date when the theatre will be open for engagements. It is expected that the influenza epidemic will be over before December.

Mid-Week Market

There were about a dozen teams in the market this morning, vegetables being the commonest produce. Turnips sold for 60 cents to \$1.00 a barrel, potatoes \$2.75 a barrel, eggs 60 cents a dozen, butter 45 to 50 cents a pound. Beef sold for 12 cents by the hind quarter, lamb \$1.50 to \$2.50 a quarter, apples \$2.50 to \$3.50 a barrel. Pickers sold for varying prices.

MISSING MAN WAS LOCATED YESTERDAY

PTE. J. STACKABLE
FOUND NEAR CARLOW

Lived Since Tuesday of Last
Week in Sporting Camps
—Used Boards as
Crutches.

Private J. Stackable the soldier of No. 7 District Depot who was missing since Tuesday of last week, was found yesterday afternoon on the Richibucto Road near Carlow some thirteen miles from Fredericton. He was brought to the city in a wagon last night and placed in the Military Hospital. Today it is reported from the hospital that two of the toes of his remaining foot are infected and that it is possible that amputation will take place. Otherwise the soldier appears to have come through his trying experience without any very bad results.

Found by Resident of Carlow

A party of Dominion Police with a member of the C. A. M. C. went out to search for the missing soldier yesterday with Harry Mount of Kitchen's Livery Stable as driver. Near Carlow they met David Hughes driving toward Fredericton with Stackable in his wagon. In the afternoon a resident of Carlow either saw or heard Stackable who had become bogged in wet ground. Not being able to do anything for the soldier on account of his own illness the man told David Hughes who was hunting nearby and he got his wagon and started for the city with the man who was in a very weak condition.

Lived in Sporting Camps

Stackable who frequently goes by the name of "Andy Stack" told his rescuers that he tried to drive to his home in Minto on Tuesday of last week. Near Carlow he fell out of the carriage. He had previously lost one of his crutches and the other was in the carriage the horse going on. He crawled off the road and finding two boards improvised a pair of crutches. With these he made his way some distance and after wandering about came upon a sporting camp owned by Mr. W. A. Lindsay of this city. He broke into that camp and there found food. Details of Stackable's story are not clear but it is believed that he re-
