PRAISE FOR WILSON.

Mr. T. P. O'Connor, M.P., the well known Irish publicist, in a recent letter to the press, says:

"Unconsciously, but after the manner of a dramatic genius, President Wilson brought the tremendous drama of the last three weeks to a brilliant denouement, which sent all Europe to its feet in delirious applause. I indicated rather than expressed the apprehension his unique position naturally excited, playing a lone hand three thousand miles away, with our Ambassador absent from Washington and yours away from London. Two sections of opinion were the most feverish, namely, the protectionists, who dread Mr. Wilson's democratic ideal of a league of nations, with an absence of commercial boycotts, and another and much larger section composed of those who are so enraged by Germany's atrocities that they contemplate nothing but the most drastic punishment and unconditional surrender. Lord Milner, who has been regarded hitherto as the embodiment of rigid, narrow and ruthless imperialism, has excited an intense feeling by pleading that Germany, if not delicately handled, might get Bolshevism, and even the enemies of Lord Northcliffe approve his stirring condemnation of Milner. But Mr. Wilson satisfied everybody and his last message was the best of any he has yet delivered. The bitterest enemy of the Kaiser in Germany can add nothing to the firmness and clearness of Mr. Wilson's demands.

"Does it mean peace soon? The balance of opinion here is that Germany is in such terrible straits that she must yield to all of Mr. Wilson's demands and that must mean peace. On the other hand, if Germany persists, the peace terms will rise higher, become more bitter, and the fourteen points will disappear as our maximum."

The mysterious "William Tompson"—the man who, according to evidence brought out at the potato enquiry, went into the Fredericton branch of the Bank of Montreal and sent \$32,900 to Mr. F. W. Sumner, of Moncton, has been located at last. At the present time he is pastor of the Marysville Baptist church and goes by the name of Daggett. The money which he forwarded to Mr. Sumner was to repay a loan negotiated by the late Premier Clarke with the object of concealing a loss made in shipping "surplus potatoes" to the island of Cuba. Mr. Daggett was formerly Secretary of Agriculture, but promptly pitched the job when the change of administration came.

The evidence brought out in the patriotic potato enquiry makes it abundantly clear that Rev. J. B. Daggett, when Secretary of Agriculture, was merely acting as a tool in the hands of the knavish politicians who were then ruling the province. Mr. Daggett, in doing what he did, was evidently under the impression that he was doing "the party" a good turn. In fact he does not hesitate to say that all of his many sins of omission and commission met with the cordial approval of Hon. J. A. Murray, then Minister of Agriculture, and of the late Premier Clarke.

Commenting on the disclosures made in the Patriotic Potato enquiry, the St. John Telegraph says: "Meanwhile the public will view with increasing disgust the new revelations in the enquiry. The people of this province will ask themselves what chance their interests had in the hands of men who would do such things. From the first exposure the evidence has been startling, but no one believed that the case was so bad as it has been proved to be. And the whole story has not yet been told."

The armistice terms prepared by the representatives of the Allied powers will soon be in the hands of the Huns. Emissaries are now en route

from Berlin to the Allied front and will be given the terms under which the Allies will accept an armistice. There is nothing for the Huns to do but accept; but they will probably take plenty of time to consider the matter.

The German Socialist party, acting through Philip Scheidemann, have asked the Chancellor to request the abdication of Kaiser William. There is little danger of the request being heeded at the present time.

New Brunswick is swinging into the Victory Loan campaign in fine spirit. Let us see that the momentum is continued to the close of the campaign.

Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery in Fredericton the cortege reaching the Fredericton Highway Bridge at four o'clock. Rev. Dr. Harrison will conduct the service at the residence of Mr. James Gibson.

Surviving Relatives

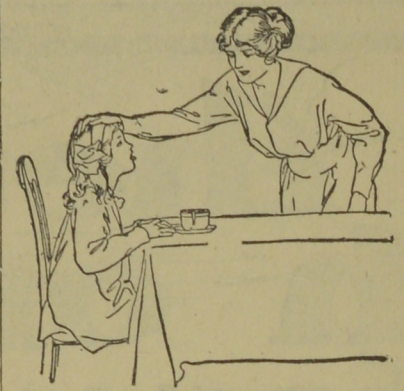

The latter position he held after the mill passed out of the control of the Gibson family leaving it several years ago after the mill was taken by the Canadian Colored Cottons Limited the present owners. At all times he was prominent in the life of the community and had a large number of friends. He possessed a fine tenor voice and frequently was heard as a vocalist at local musical entertainments.
