

## BREEDERS' SALE ANNOUNCED FOR THE 21ST INST.

### INFLUENZA BAN TO BE RAISED SHORTLY

Interprovincial Conference at  
Ottawa on the 19th Inst.—  
N. B. Representatives  
to Attend.

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture for New Brunswick announced this morning that the breeders' consignment sale of pure bred livestock will take place on Thursday the 21st inst. at the Exhibition Buildings in this city. This sale was postponed from the 7th inst. on account of the epidemic of influenza. Hon. Dr. Roberts Minister of Health has permitted the sale to take place on the 21st under any circumstances but it is probable that the ban on public gatherings will be raised before that date.

#### Government Session Closed

The monthly meeting of the provincial government closed at an early hour this morning an extra effort being made to complete the schedule. The majority of the members left for their homes this morning. The influenza epidemic was discussed. Hon. Dr. Roberts arriving last night. It is probable that the order forbidding public gatherings will be rescinded at least in certain sections of the province not later than Sunday the 17th.

#### Conference at Ottawa

Premier Foster, Hon. J. F. Tweeddale and Hon. C. W. Robinson will go to Ottawa to attend the interprovincial conference which will open on the 19th. On that account Hon. Mr. Tweeddale will be unable to attend the livestock sale here. A conference of provincial premiers will take place on the 18th.

#### Assignment at St. John

T. Kenneth Raymond of St. John City, clerk, on October 30th made an assignment for the benefit of his creditors. Sheriff A. A. Wilson is the assignee.

#### Had Wagon Repaired

The youth who succeeded in smashing a farm wagon in Phoenix Square yesterday morning was rounded up by the police and took the broken vehicle around to a carriage factory for repairs.

#### Contract Awarded

The contract for the Renous River Mouth Bridge, Parish of Blackville, Northumberland County has been awarded to D. C. Burpee, son of South Devon. The contract price is in the vicinity of \$29,000.

#### Death at Nashwaak Village

The death occurred at Nashwaak Vill. Tuesday evening of Edward McNeill son of Michael McNeill of that place. The deceased was forty years of age and leaves a widow and several children. The death was caused by pneumonia.

#### Case Up This Afternoon

The case of a girl who was brought to Fredericton from Keswick by the Children's Aid Society came before the police magistrate this afternoon. A complaint was made that she was ill used and papers were served upon the parties concerned. The case was stood over from Monday.

#### Late Ernest Bubar

The death occurred at Durham Bridge Wednesday morning of Ernest Bubar son of Mr. and Mrs. Elias Bubar. The deceased was twenty-five years of age and is survived by his parents and two brothers. The funeral took place Thursday afternoon. The death was caused by pneumonia.

#### King-Heaton

At St. Ann's church Kingsclear, on October 29th Rev. M. Howland united in marriage Mr. Peter King of Kingsclear and Miss Emily Heaton of the same place. Miss May Goodine was bridesmaid and Mr. Dominic King supported the groom. Friends in Kingsclear and elsewhere wish them all happiness.

#### Heavy Fine Imposed

The drunk who was arrested in Devon on Tuesday evening appeared before Police Magistrate Limerick yesterday. The man was drunk when arrested and had in his possession a bottle of whiskey received on a physician's prescription for some person other than himself. He defaced the label on the bottle so as to destroy all evidence as to whom it belonged. There were only about ten ounces of liquor left in the bottle when he was arrested. The fine for drunkenness was allowed to stand but for the other offence a fine of \$58 or three months in jail was imposed. The offender was lodged in a cell last evening.

## STANLEY YOUNG DIED OF WOUNDS IN ENGLAND

### WELL KNOWN YOUNG ATHLETE OF THIS CITY

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles D. Young—Sergt. Harry Russell Reported to be Improved.

Two more Fredericton men have sacrificed their lives for their country in the effort to down the Hun. Mr. Charles D. Young of this city received word this morning that Private Stanley Young had died of gunshot wounds received in action. Private Clifford Jukes of Victoria Mills has also been killed in action by a fragment of the same shell that killed Robert McArthur of this city.

#### Private Stanley Young

This morning Mr. Charles D. Young received official notice that his son Private Stanley Young had died of wounds on November 4th. Private Young was admitted to No. 22 Casualty Clearing Station on October 10th ill with gunshot wounds in the arm, neck and shoulder. Later he was removed to No. 14 General Hospital at Wimereux. Several telegrams following stated his condition as improved. A later telegram arrived stating that he had been moved to Pavilion and Military Place Hospital, Brighton, England. Since that his condition instead of improving declined. Private Young enlisted with the 104th Battalion and left this side in July, 1916. He went to France in April of this year with a well known Canadian Battalion and had seen about three years' service. Previous to his enlistment he was employed by the Yerca Grocery Co. after leaving school. He was in his twenty-first year and was a well known athlete taking a prominent part in all branches of athletics. He was especially known as a baseball player. He is survived by his parents Mr. and Mrs. Charles D. Young of this city and by two sisters Leila and Alice.

#### Private Clifford Jukes

Word was received yesterday that Private Clifford Jukes of Victoria Mills, was killed in action September 29th. Private Jukes enlisted with the 236th MacLean Highlanders and went overseas with that battalion about a year ago. When the 236th Battalion was broken up he was transferred to a well known battalion of Canadian Highlanders. He spent about eight months in France. The deceased was twenty-three years of age and is survived by a widow and one child.

#### Sergeant Russell Recovering

Word has been received by Mrs. Bessie Russell, Northumberland Street that her husband Sergeant Harry Russell who was admitted to No. 2 Western General Hospital on October 3rd suffering from gunshot wounds is recovering.

## FREDERICTON TORE LOOSE ON PEACE RUMOR

### IMPROMPTU CELEBRATION THIS AFTERNOON

Fire Alarm, Bells, Whistles, All Joined in the Din—Motors and Carriages in Procession.

A report of the signing of an armistice by the Germans came over the wires about two o'clock today. The news took but a short time to circulate and then the citizens broke loose. The first idea that some of the unsuspecting citizens had of the news was when a little after two o'clock the Cathedral Chimes burst out into "God Save the King" and "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow." Then the fire alarm, whistles and the various church bells were got into working order.

#### In Queen Street

Queen Street resembled somewhat Milton's idea of Pandemonium with the exception that everywhere were crowds doing nothing but celebrating. One prominent lawyer of this city with a full car ran down a "silent policeman" and tried to clear a way through a wagon. A shot was fired at the upper end of town and a returned soldier hearing the report was seized with shell shock and taken to the hospital.

Wagons with horns blowing and tin whistles playing patrolled up and down Queen Street. Autos decorated with flags and horns blowing made noise enough for the whole city. The fire truck drove through the streets with the huge siren whirling. Many of the stores of the city were closed for the afternoon as work is impossible for some under the strain of the news. Grown-ups acted like children under the excitement and kiddies of all descriptions paraded the back streets shouting the news "War is Over." A parade managed to make its way down Queen Street in spite of the numerous cars and carriages and gave a real celebration. Employees of factories were clustered in record breaking numbers on the various trucks and wagons making merry. Girls were so wrapped up in their thoughts that their sweet-hearts "over there" would soon be home that substitutes they seized on had a hard time to convince themselves that they were not dreaming. Everything was topsy-turvy, cars running backward and everyone acting childishly. The mayor headed the parade and cars and wagons galore were present.
