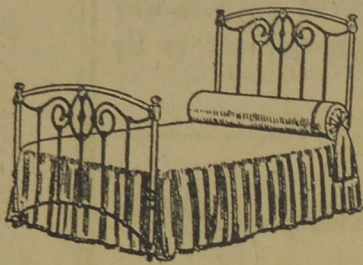


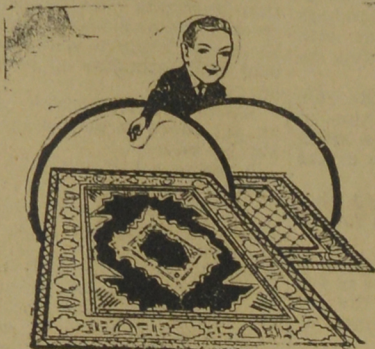

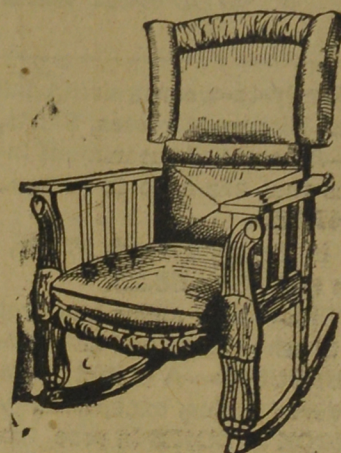

Public Health Bill

HON. MR. ROBERTS said that the present act provided for a bacteriologist and pathologist. There was already a laboratory, but as the facilities were limited, it did not give the desired results. Under the terms of the bill, it might be necessary to establish a second laboratory in some central part of the province, in which case the bacteriologist would have charge of both. For that reason he would be known as the chief of laboratories. In comparison with states in the American Union, where similar legislation was in force, the number of officials to be appointed under the bill was small.

HON. MR. ROBERTS, replying to Mr. Crockett, said the chief health officer would be a sanitary engineer, and would combine that knowledge with his other duties.

THE CHAIRMAN said that Section 6 having been amended by striking out the salary of \$2,100 to be paid the minister, it would be necessary to eliminate the section from the bill altogether.

MR. BAXTER said that he proposed to move an amendment that only the word "twenty" should be struck out, as he felt it was necessary for the minister to consult the people.

MR. McGRATH said that as the object of the bill was to assuage the enemies of the human race, it should not be obstructed by hon. members opposite. He thought it should be passed by the House as a war measure, on the Union Government principle.

MR. MURRAY (Kings) said he agreed to the principle of the bill, and he wished to assure the member for Northumberland that the opposition had no desire to obstruct its passage; it was their duty and right to criticize and assist in making the measure as perfect as possible.

MR. BAXTER, on the motion to eliminate Section 6 moved an amendment that only the word "twenty" be struck out.

HON. MR. VENIOT said that the amendment proposed by the hon. member for St. John county caused him to doubt the statement of the hon. leader of the opposition that there was no desire on that side of the House to obstruct the bill. The section which it was proposed to amend, had already been passed upon by the House, yet the hon. member for St. John county was seeking to amend it, which virtually amounted to obstruction.

MR. BAXTER said he was not moving his amendment for the purpose of obstruction, although he realized that it would add to the delay. His amendment was put forward to affirm the principles of constitutional government, and with the hope that his hon. friends might be made to recognize such a principle. It had been the original intention to give the minister a salary but that section had been struck out for the palpable purpose of avoiding an election and submitting the act to the judgment of the people. He thought the government should have due regard for the principles of constitutional government.

HON. MR. ROBERTS said as to the constitutional principle of a minister going back to the people for reelection, no attempt was being made by the promoter of the bill to settle that question, and it was not held that the passage of the Act would settle it. He wished to assure the hon. member for St. John county that the government wished only to act along constitutional lines.

HON. MR. ROBERTS said he had already expressed a willingness to act as head of the department without remuneration and he would stand by that. He could assure the House that if he were chosen to administer the department he would not act unless it was in accordance with the constitution. If it should be found necessary for him, before taking charge of the department to go before the people for reelection, he would not hesitate to do so, and would not be afraid of the result.

On the vote being taken, the amendment of Mr. Baxter was declared lost.

MR. BAXTER moved that the words "Chief of Laboratories" be struck from the list of officials to be appointed under the bill, and be replaced by the words "bacteriologist and pathologist."

HON. MR. ROBERTS said that the term "Chief of Laboratories" was used by all other departments of the kind in America. He said that in case a second laboratory should be established in the province, the one official would have charge of both. He was willing that the words "bacteriologist and pathologist" should be added to Chief of Laboratories.

MR. BAXTER accepted the suggestion and the amendment was made accordingly.

HON. MR. ROBERTS replying to Mr. Crockett, said that the chief office of the Health Department would be located in the Departmental Building at Fredericton.

MR. BAXTER on Section 6, which provides that the expense of suppressing an epidemic should be borne by the community or municipality, said he thought the section might be a hardship on small communities or municipalities.

HON. MR. ROBERTS said that the section was in accordance with the present law.

HON. MR. ROBERTS said that another section of the bill provide that in case an epidemic broke out in a border municipality, the province would share in the expense, but it was thought that the rule should not apply in the case of a local epidemic.

HON. MR. TWEEDDALE thought that the point raised by the hon. member for St. John was well taken.

HON. MR. VENIOT said that municipalities had never been relieved in the past and he hoped they would not be in the future. The law had always been that the municipalities must pay

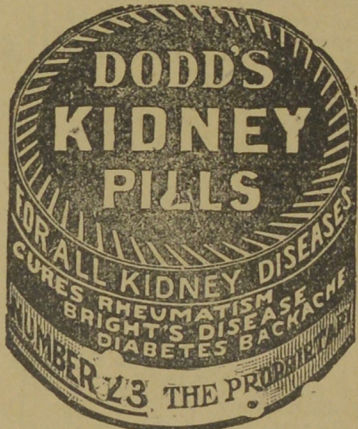
for putting down epidemics on the order of the Board of Health, but a provision in the law provided that they might be reimbursed by the province.

HON. MR. ROBERTS said that a section of the bill provided that in cases where one municipality prevented the spread of an epidemic to an adjoining municipality, the province would share the expense.

MR. MICHAUD held that as the section stood the government would be able to pay a share of the costs of putting down an epidemic, the same as under the old law.

HON. MR. VENIOT had an amendment inserted empowering the government to pay the whole or any portion of the expenses of the treasury of the province.
