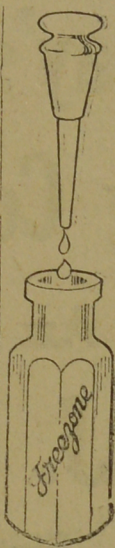

would allow the section to stand in order that the matter might be further looked into.

MR. BAXTER thought that 50 persons was rather small to constitute a village. He thought the number should be at least 100.

HON. MR. FOSTER said he was prepared to make a change in the Bill should it be found necessary. The object of the measure was to enable people in small communities to get together with a view of improving conditions.

HON. MR. FOSTER suggested that the term of office of Village Councillors should be two years.

MR. MAGEE suggested that the Councillors be elected in rotation for a term of three years.

MR. MURRAY (Kings) said the suggestion was a good one.

The section was allowed to stand.

MR. MAGEE speaking to the section relating to the qualification of women voters said there should be a property qualification.

MR. McGRATH also said he favored a property qualification.

The section was allowed to stand.

MR. BAXTER speaking about the oath of office, set out in the Bill, said it was fearful and wonderful and offered other criticism.

HON. MR. BYRNE said the situation might arise that a man desirous of being a Councillor might have a contract prior to the Village being incorporated as was mentioned in the oath. Notwithstanding the remarks of his Hon. friend from St. John County, he believed that every safeguard should be thrown about the office of Village Councillor.

HON. MR. FOSTER said the man who drafted the Bill probably knew as much as did the critics on the opposite side of the House. The oath was copied out of another Act which was in use, but it might well stand over for further consideration.

MR. BAXTER said the Bill was overloaded with detail and with provisions for contingencies that probably never would arise. There was every indication that the Bill had been prepared by means of scissors and paste pot.

HON. MR. BYRNE said there was a demand throughout the Province for just such a Bill as this. The detail criticised by his Hon. friend from St. John he considered one of the excellent features of the Act. The provisions for contingencies were good.

MR. YOUNG spoke in opposition to the section permitting Councillors to petition for the change of the name of any village. He believed a referendum of the rate payers should be held.

HON. MR. BYRNE said that the Council would be the mouth piece of the rate payers. The Bill provided sufficient safeguard unless his Hon. friends opposite wanted more "detail".

MR. YOUNG said it might be twelve months before the rate payers could express their objection by means of an election.

MR. McGRATH said he was opposed to too frequent changes in the names of places.

HON. MR. BAXTER said that he absolved the Hon. Attorney-General from participation in the preparation of the Bill, but the latter was overloaded with detail and was much too lengthy and involved.

CROWN LAND MATTERS DISCUSSED IN THE HOUSE

The Legislation of the Old Government Prohibiting the Export of Pulp Wood From Crown Lands Did Not Become Effective—Operators Allowed to Mix Their Logs—The Miramichi Lumber Company the Chief Offender.

The Legislature was in session nearly three hours on Friday afternoon, and after disposing of considerable business, adjourned until Monday evening at 8.30. It was announced that money collected from municipalities this year for the Patriotic Fund would go into Consolidated Revenue Account and be handled by the province. The amount assessed will be the same as last year.

The bill to facilitate the collection of stumpage provoked an interesting discussion in regard to the cutting of pulp wood on Crown Lands. It seems that an act passed in the days of Mr. J. K. Flemming to put a stop to the export of it was never enforced. It came out during the discussion that several lumbering concerns which had been cutting pulp wood on Crown Lands owed the province \$250,000 for stumpage.

The House met at 3 o'clock.

Bills relating to Fraser Companies, Limited, and the town of Edmundston; to Side and Top Wharfage in the City of St. John; to Short-term Debentures in said City; and to fix the valuation on property of the Fraser Companies, Limited, in Fredericton, were read a third time and passed.

HON. MR. VENIOT in answering a

HON. MR. BYRNE said he could see no reason why the Hon. member from St. John County should ridicule this Bill. When Attorney General of the preceding administration, he had sat in the House when many Bills with just as much detail had been considered. He could not help but notice the attitude taken by the Hon. members on the opposite side, but he could inform them that he had no intention of being intimidated.

An Important Bill
MR. MAGEE said that this Bill was important to all residents of small communities. Perhaps some of the Hon. members opposite had not had the privilege of residing in small villages. This was a matter of importance to a large section of the population of the Province and was one on which the co-operation of all members of the House was desirable. He hoped that those on the other side of the House who did not come from small communities could bring themselves to give the assistance in the consideration of this Bill that they should.

MR. BAXTER said that no one had yet shown that this Act was needed. The Towns Incorporation Act in force for some time furnished all the machinery necessary. Not more than three communities would ask for incorporation under this Act.

MR. MAGEE "There will be that many in Westmorland."

MR. BAXTER said that he had no objection to anyone attempting the pinnacle of ridiculousness. The Bill was a conglomeration of idiocy. He had offered criticism in the hope of bringing about some improvement. As usual a certain member of the Government had replied to his suggestions with a speech repellent in tone practically intimating that the Bill must be passed because the

speaker had offered objection to it.
HON. MR. BAXTER said that section 48 put too great powers in the hands of the Provincial Secretary in the matter of winding up the affairs of a village. This power might be used to persecute some community for he had found during the last Session that the House divided on straight party lines on a matter as purely local as concrete sidewalks in the Parish of Lancaster.

MR. TILLEY urged that the House be democratic and not give such power to the Provincial Secretary.

After passing section 49 the Committee rose and reported progress.

The House adjourned at 10.25 p.m.
