on the time of the staff. He wanted hon. members to understand that he did not offer this suggestion with any desire to withhold information.

MR. SMITH (Carleton) said that if the Auditor General's report was available, it would not have been necessary for him to have made so many inquiries, but people were writing to him for information and he had to get it the best way he could. He had no desire to embarrass the department.

The following notice of inquiry was given:

By MR. SMITH (Carleton) as to the number of applications for grants of land under the Labor Act since the present government took office.

The Patriotic Fund.

HON. MR. ROBINSON introduced a bill to amend the act relating to the Canadian Patriotic Fund. He explained that the act provided for the same assessment upon municipalities as last year. The Chairman of the committee had reported that the amount to be paid to the General Patriotic Fund would not be so great this year as last. The total amount paid over last year was \$518,000, while for the present year it would not exceed \$400,000. The assessment would be the same as last year, and the amount, if not required for the general fund, would be devoted to other patriotic purposes. In this connection he wished to point out that the expenditure made for patriotic potatoes would have to be taken care of by a bond issue. The bill provided that the amount to be assessed would be paid direct to the government instead of to the Patriotic Fund, as formerly, and would be dispensed by the government.

There had been complaints that the present system was unsatisfactory to the municipalities, the authorities of which complained that they could get no information as to the handling of the fund. Under the proposed bill the money would go to the Consolidated Revenue Fund and a statement would appear in the accounts.

HON. MR. TWEEDDALE introduced a bill to amend the municipalities act relating to the County of Victoria; and also a bill to amend the act relating to the high cost of living.

Was Misrepresented.


HON. MR. VENIOT rose to a question of privilege. He said that he had no objection to newspaper criticism of his public acts, so long as the same was based on facts; but he did object to any newspaper misrepresenting him. He had before him a copy of the Fredericton Gleaner, which in bold headlines stated that he (Veniott) proposed to levy direct taxation on cities and towns in support of the highways. He thought all hon. members would bear him out in the statement that the paper was not stating the facts. The suggestion had been made to him that a special tax of one-tenth of one percent. should be levied on cities and towns for the support of roads in the vicinity of those cities and towns. It was not his own proposal and he had merely passed it along to the House for an expression of opinion. The hon. Minister here quoted from the official report the statement he had made to the House in reference to the matter. He had

AUDIOR'S REPORT AT MARYSVILLE

Slight Over-expenditure, But Collections Very Good—
John Finnemore, Town Treasurer.

Marysville, Mar. 23. — The annual report of Town Auditor Dailey was presented to the Marysville Town Council at its last meeting. The report is as follows:

Marysville, March 17, 1918.

To His Worship the Mayor and Councilors of the Town of Marysville, N. B.:

I have the honor to submit to you my report and audit of the books and accounts of Mr. John Finnemore, town treasurer, for the year ending February 28th, 1918, and beg to state that I have found all payments duly authorized and properly vouched for. I have to thank your treasurer and clerk for assistance rendered. I consider the collections remarkably good under the trying circumstances of the present year and with the unforeseen expenditure for the relief of stricken Halifax, I consider the financial standing very satisfactory. bills to authorize the City of Moncton HON. MR. ROBINSON introduced to sell certain lands; to amend laws relating to the assessment of rates and taxes in the City of Moncton; to enable the City of Moncton to fix the assessment of Humphrey's Glass, Limited, of Moncton; and to amend the act relating to the Town of Moncton.

The House went into committee with Mr. McGrath in the chair, and took up further consideration of the bill to amend the St. John City Assessment Act.

HON. MR. FOSTER said that when the bill was before the House yesterday he had asked to have progress reported. He had since received a telegram from the mayor of St. John, stating that the parties who had purchased Victory Bonds had been practically promised that the city would exempt same from taxation. In view of that he would not oppose the passage of the bill.

HON. MR. ROBINSON said that Moncton proposed to ask for similar legislation. In his opinion the bill should be made general.

HON. MR. VENIOT agreed with that view. He said that he had addressed a number of meetings during the Victory Loan campaign and had, at the request of the committee, given assurance that the bonds would not be taxed.

MR. MURRAY (Kings) approved of the suggestion of his hon. friend from Moncton. He was aware of the fact that in the County of Kings people who purchased bonds were assured that they would not be taxed on the same.

similar understanding in the County of Albert.

MR. MERSEREAU wanted to know if the income from Victory Bonds was liable to taxation. He said it would mean quite a lot to small country villages.

MR. BAXTER said that under the assessment law of the small country place known as St. John the income from the bonds would be assessed for taxation.

MR. SWEENEY thought that the bill should stand and a general bill be introduced by the government. He scarcely thought it was fair to discriminate against other bonds, some of which had been issued for patriotic purposes and were serving just as good a purpose as the Victory Bonds. He thought the matter deserved a little more consideration from the House. Those who had promised exemption of Victory Bonds evidently did so without authority, and therefore deceived the public. He thought there should be a general measure for the whole province and it should be widened to include other bonds.

MR. BAXTER said that under legislation, provincial and municipal bonds were now exempt from taxation, but that exemption did not include bonds issued by the government of Canada.

HON. MR. ROBINSON said that he was a member of the Moncton committee on Victory Bonds but had given no assurance that they would be exempted from taxation. He was not satisfied in his own mind that it was the right thing to do, as it meant buying a man's patriotism. He pointed out that war bonds were taxed in Great Britain and the people of New Brunswick should not be so lacking in patriotism as to raise an objection to the tax, still as exemption had been promised, he proposed to stand by it.

MR. BAXTER said he had objected to Victory Bonds being taxed in St. John, as the rate of taxation, 2½ per cent, meant that nearly one-half of the yield from the bonds would be required to pay it. The rate would be higher than the Federal tax on income.

HON. MR. FOSTER, after promising that a general bill would be introduced, moved that progress be reported.

Collection of Stumpage

The House again went into committee, with Mr. Leger (West.) in the chair, and took up consideration of the bill to facilitate the collection of stumpage.

HON. MR. SMITH said that the bill required lumber operators to make a statement showing their cut for a period of twelve months on Crown Lands as well as granted lands. A change in the date for filing such statement had been made from October 1st to May 1st. Another change required shippers of pulpwood to file their statement before December 21st instead of at the end of the calendar year.

MR. MURRAY (Kings) wanted to know if the act of 1917 had produced the desired result.

HON. MR. SMITH said it was too late when the act was passed to obtain a statement of the amount of lumber in the yards, but he had been hopeful that one might be obtained when the logs reached the boom. However, the department had received some sworn statements. There would be more time during the present year, and the date for filing the statements had been changed to May 1st.

MR. TILLEY asked what was the stumpage on pulpwood.

HON. MR. SMITH replied that it was the ordinary rate, plus 20 per cent.

MR. McGRATH asked if the cutting of pulpwood on Crown Lands had not been prohibited.

Cutting of Pulpwood.

HON. MR. SMITH replied that it was prohibited, but an arrangement




