Cabbage was sold for 2 cents per pound, pork for 25 cents and veal from 14 to 20 cents per pound. Butter and eggs as usual were in great demand. The former sold for 35 and 38 cents per pound, while the latter went for 50 cents per dozen. There was an abundance of wood in the market this morning but buyers were hard to find, prices being high.
