PARIS FACES INCREASED COST OF WASHING

Paris June 15.—Since the war began the price of washing has at least doubled. Now the public has been warned by the Washwomen's Union, (it sounds prettier in French—l'Union Patronale des Blanchisseuses de Paris) that a 20 per cent increase is to be added to present rates.

Everything has gone up they explain, which will have a familiar ring to Americans. The vast majority of washwomen take their work to the lavoirs, where they rent tubs, driers and the like at so much per day.

The lavoirs, or public wash houses, which used to charge a ten cent fee, now charge 20. The driers which used to be rented for 6 cents now are ten. The water rate used to be a sou, now it is two sous and blue and the like are in the same proportion.

Further, many of the women who used to do this work now prefer to work in munitions factories. It is gravely added that because of the increased prices Paris does not change its linen so often, so receipts have fallen off.

At the great public laundry, which is paying the fuel dictators price of \$30 a ton for coal and \$41 for coke, the question of raising prices, which were raised 160 per cent four years ago is under advisement.

Agitation is under way for building municipal wash houses to replace the 120 establishments of the kind closed in Paris and suburbs because of war conditions.



HERE IS THE DAY YOU REGISTER

ON June 22nd, Saturday, every man and woman, resident in Canada, who is 16 years and over, must attend at one of the places provided for registration, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 10 p.m., and there truthfully answer all the questions set forth upon the registration card.

Upon signing the card, vouching for the accuracy of the answers, the man or woman will receive a Registration Certificate, as shown below, which must be carried upon the person thereafter.

Why the Certificate is so Important

For failure to register a maximum fine of \$100 and one month's imprisonment is provided, also an added penalty of \$10 for each day the person remains unregistered after June 22nd.


Persons remaining unregistered cannot lawfully be employed, and cannot draw wages for work done after June 22nd. Employers who keep unregistered persons in their employ will be liable for fines equal in amount to those recoverable from the unregistered employees.

Unregistered persons cannot lawfully purchase transportation tickets, and may find themselves barred from traveling on railroads, steamboats, etc. Similarly they may be denied board and lodging at any hotel, restaurant, public house or boarding house.

In a word—All persons remaining unregistered and all persons having dealings with unregistered persons, knowing them to be such, incur heavy penalties under the law.
