

## WIN-THE-WAR RECIPES

These recipes are issued by the Fredericton Food Control Committee.

## Brown Sugar Tapioca.

Pearl tapioca, 1 cup.

Water, 4 cups.

Salt, ¼ teaspoon.

Brown sugar, 2 cups.

Soak pearl tapioca in 3 cups water over night. In the morning add salt and the other cup of water. Cook 40 minutes in the upper part of a double boiler or until transparent. Add the brown sugar and juice of 1 lemon. Pour into a buttered baking dish and bake in a moderate oven one half hour. Serve hot or cold with cream and sugar. The lemon juice may be omitted and the pudding served with lemon sauce.

Yield, 10 servings; cost of recipe, 20c. This recipe has been tested by Mrs. J. J. F. Winslow.

## Bran Muffins.

Bran, 2 cups.

Flour, 1 cup.

Sour milk or buttermilk, 1½ cups.

Butter, scant ¼ cup.

Soda, 1 teaspoon.

Molasses, 3 tablespoons.

Bake 30 to 40 minutes in moderate oven.

## Split Pea Soup.

Dried split peas, 1 cup.

Cold water 2½ quarts.

Milk, 1 pint.

Onion, ½.

Butter, 3 tablespoons.

Flour, 2 tablespoons.

Salt, 1½ teaspoons.

Pepper, ¼ teaspoon.

2-inch cube of fat salt pork.

Pick over peas and soak for several hours; drain; add cold water, pork and onion. Simmer 3 or four hours, or until soft. Rub through a sieve; add butter and flour cooked together, salt and pepper. Dilute with milk, adding more if necessary. The water in which a ham has been cooked may be used; in such case omit salt.—Boston Cooking School Book.
