"It is vital that shipments for the Allies from America in January, February and March shall be accelerated to the utmost. They must not be be low the average of 1,000,000 tons per month. As a means toward securing this not only for ourselves but for our allies, we almost heartily welcome the news of Mr. Hoover's wheatless days and wheatless meals.

"The supply of bacon, hams and lard is so short that the January shipments now in sight are scarcely likely to be enough to fill the army's requirements for this month. Civilians

### The Meat Question.

On the subject of meat generally Lord Rhondda said: "Figures, based on the number in the country show that there is likely to be a deficiency of nearly thirty per cent. for the civilian supply compared with last year, and about 45 per cent. compared with 1913-14. The shortage in home supis likely to continue until feed ing on the pastures becomes possible in the spring. In the meantime we must rely on Mr. Hoover's meatless days to increase our imports.

"We are diverting tonnage in order to take all the meat he will give us The butcher is only allowed to have fifty per cent. of the supplies he dis posed of in October last, and economy in the use of meat is the natural re sult. With sugar compulsory rationing seems to be working well, but tonnage difficulties make it doubtful if we shall be able to maintain the weekly ration at a half pound per capita.

### Dairy Produce Short.

"The supplies of butter, margarine and cheese are all very short throughout the country.

"The larger centres of population in the United Kingdom are being group ed into related areas, namely, London and the home counties, containing about one-third of the whole popula tion. Area shipments are to be for mulated, all providing for compulsory rationing of butter and margarine and many other commodities, including meat, bacon, lard and tea.

In illustration of his statement regarding the health of the country, Lord Rhondda cited the fact that the deaths in the United Kingdom for the third quarter of 1916 were 10.9 per thousand, compared with 13.5 in the third quarter of 1914 and the death rate among children was 91 compared with 126 in the same period. This with a large fraction of the most robust members of the population who serve in the army.
