THE DAWN OF PEACE.

Under the caption of "The Dawn of Peace," the Toronto Globe publishes the following interesting article:

"Like a brilliant bow of promise, arching the thunder-stricken eastern horizon, comes the news of peace! How glibly we used that word four years ago, how little it meant to most of us then. How much it means to the war-weary nerve-shocked and hysterical world today. To us in Canada it means much. It will bring comfort and joy to those whose sons, whose fathers and brothers, have borne the battle so long. Peace will not bring back the fallen, neither will it restore the broken bodies of hundreds of heroes who came out of the inferno of battle with shattered remnants of their former selves. Sorrow and suffering will remain with us, and neither this generation nor the next will remove entirely the terrible marks of the world's crucifixion. Well might the world be sorrowful to the end of time if the peace that has been given to us were any other than it is. It is a peace bought with a tremendous price, but a peace that is worth the price paid. The portion of the price that has fallen to us on this continent was small compared with that which has been exacted by a brutal tyranny from the people of France and Belgium. From them has indeed been demanded—and by them has been paid—"the uttermost farthing." Only those captive and heartlessly oppressed and outraged people know to the full what war means, and only they can fully realize and appreciate the glad and glorious import of this word which spreads like a golden shaft of light athwart the world—PEACE!"

THE KING'S MESSAGE.

The following message received by the Governor General at Ottawa from His Majesty the King will be read with the greatest interest by all Canadians:

"At the moment when the armistice is signed, bringing, I trust, a final end to hostilities, which have convulsed the whole world for four years, I desire to send a message of greeting and heartfelt gratitude to my overseas peoples, whose wonderful efforts and sacrifices have contributed so largely to secure the victory which is now won. Together we have borne this tremendous burden in the fight for justice and liberty. Together we can now rejoice at the realization of these great aims for which we entered the struggle. The whole Empire pledged its word not to sheath the sword until our end was accomplished. That pledge is now redeemed. The outbreak of the war found the whole Empire one. I rejoice to think that the end of the struggle finds the Empire still more closely united by the common resolve held firm through all vicissitudes by the community of suffering and sacrifice by the dangers and triumphs shared together. The hour is one of solemn thanksgiving and of gratitude to God, whose divine providence has preserved us through all perils and crowned our arms with victory. Let us bear our triumphs in the same spirit of fortitude and self-control with which we have borne our dangers."

Former Ambassador Gerard suggests that the ex-Kaiser should be extradited from Holland, taken to England, and tried for murder. In this connection it is recalled that shortly after the Lusitania outrage a coroner's jury which held an inquest at Kinsale, Ireland, indicted the Kaiser for murder. The verdict of the jury was as follows: "The appalling crime was contrary to international law and the conventions of all civilized nations and we therefore charge the owners of the submarine, the German Emperor and the Government of Germany, under whose orders they acted, with the crime of wilful and wholesale murder."

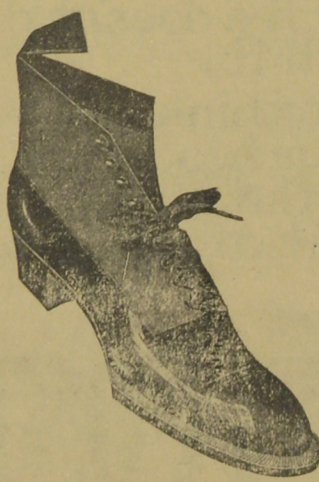
Change in Name

EXTENSION OF TICKETS

Teachers, students teachers and students at collegiate institutes are notified that arrangements have been made by Honorable Premier Foster, representing the Board of Education, with the Canadian Pacific and Canadian Government Railways, to grant extension on return portions of round trip thirty-day tickets held by bona-fide teachers and scholars who have been detained beyond the limit on account of the prevailing influenza epidemic.

It will be necessary for teachers and students when returning to re-opened schools to present the return portion of ticket to the Station Agent with credentials that they are bona-fide teachers or students, when a free ticket will be issued to each, good only for prompt passage.

Fencing the Right of Way

The Canadian Government Railways this week fenced off that portion of Queen's Square which was expropriated several years ago as a right of way for the St. John & Quebec Railway. The fencing crosses several cultivated patches which were ploughed in connection with the Increased Production campaign. The cultivators of these particular plots last summer had to obtain permits from the railway to use the land. The fencing also cuts off the road which was used by wagons going to warehouses on the eastern side of the square.
