

OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

SOUP WITHOUT MEAT.

An excellent vegetable soup can be made by cutting three potatoes, two small onions, one good sized carrot, a white turnip and two or three stalks of celery into fine strips and boiling them gently for a couple of hours in two quarts of water. Season with pepper and salt and before serving add one or two tablespoonfuls of butter. The color of the soup may be darkened by using a little browned sugar.

The water in which potatoes have been boiled, mixed with an equal quantity of milk, seasoned with pepper and salt, and made very hot, makes a very good light soup. Tomatoes stewed with a little butter and sugar, seasoned with salt, pepper and mace, and rubbed through a sieve, make an excellent soup when blended with an equal quantity of well made thin white sauce and served very hot.

CARE OF THE BROOM.

Put the straw part in boiling water and let it remain there till water gets cold, then put it out in the open air until it becomes dry. When ready to use dip it into water. Wetting the broom adds to its usefulness. On wash days dip the broom in hot soapsuds for just a minute. It makes the straw tough.

ECONOMIC HINTS.

Use shin beef for pies instead of steak. It is much cheaper and just as nice when ground fine.

Steam your bacon instead of boiling it and you will be surprised how little it wastes.

When making a cake, by adding a spoonful of vinegar with a level teaspoonful of soda dissolved in it instead of eggs, you will find it delicious.

Always dampen small coal before putting on fire. It cakes into a hard lump and gives out splendid heat.

To clean copper or brass, put some fine salt on a plate, dip into it a cut lemon and rub on metal. The strong acid will remove the worst stain.

PASSENGER SHIP TORPEDOED

London, Jan. 28.—The steamship Cork has been torpedoed. Seven passengers and five members of the crew were lost.

The Cork was 1279 tons gross and 260 feet long. She was torpedoed without warning and sank in five minutes. Many of the passengers were in their berths at the time. The survivors were landed at a port off western England.
