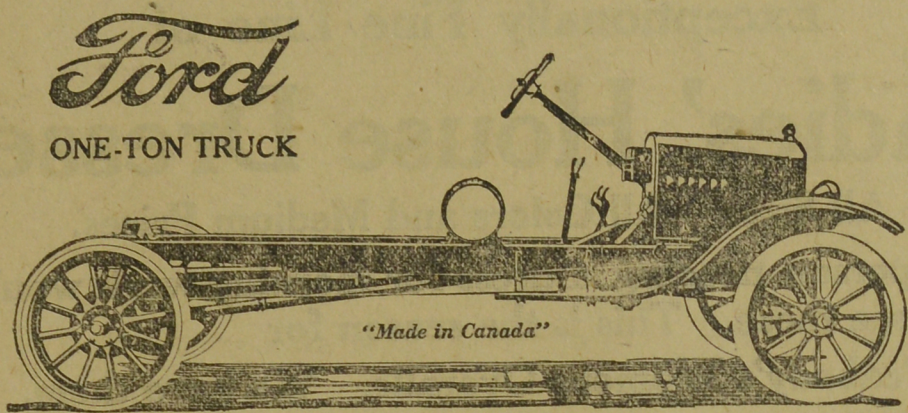

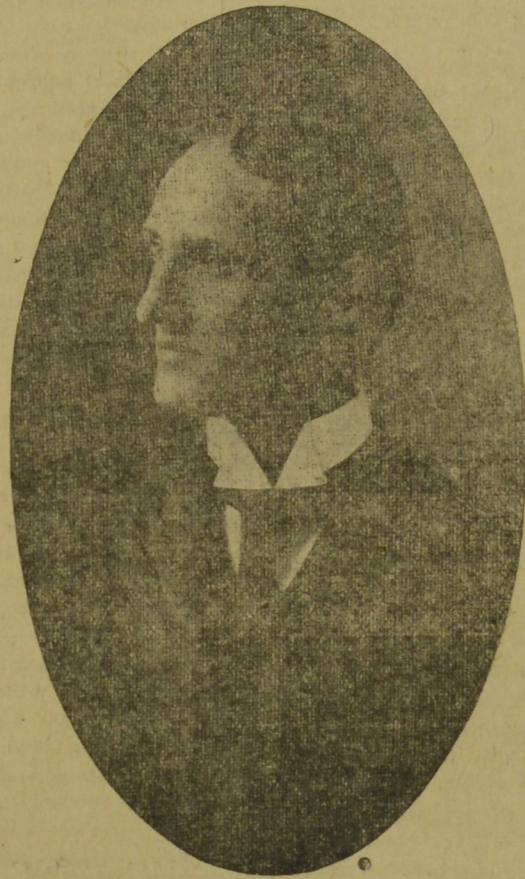

## FREDERICTON MEN WHO HAVE WON HONORS IN THE WAR

Praise for Major J. H. McDonald and His Son Major Eric McDonald---The Latter Has Been Awarded the D. S. O. For Distinguished Conduct---Commanded Guard of Honor

The Acadia Bulletin, published by Battallion, 1st Canadian Division, at Wolfville, N. S., publishes the following interesting sketches of Major (Rev.) J. H. McDonald, his son, Major Eric McDonald and Capt. N. P. McLeod, former Frederictonians who have won honors on the field of war: John Howard MacDonald, M. O. B. E. J. H. MacDonald enlisted at St. John, Nov. 23rd, 1914, and was appointed the guard of honor.

pointed chaplain of the 2nd Divisional Ammunition Column. He sailed from Canada on June 13th, 1915, and spent three months at Oterpool, England. He was transferred as chaplain to the 5th Field Ambulance, 2nd Canadian Division, and crossed to France Sept. 14th, 1915, with rank of captain. He remained with the Canadian forces in France and Belgium until April, 1916, when he was made Assistant Director of Chaplain Services at London and was promoted to the rank of major. In February, 1917, he was mentioned in despatches "for valuable services rendered." He has since been in London attending to the duties of his appointment and in January, 1918, was made a Member of the Order of the British Empire. His only child, Major Eric MacDonald, has received the D. S. O.

Eric Whidden MacDonald, D. S. O. Eric MacDonald of St. John, N. B., enlisted on August 5th, 1914, in the 12th Battalion, C.E.F., as lieutenant, and sailed from Canada in October, 1914. He remained eight months at Salisbury Plains and in June, 1915, crossed to France and joined the 10th

On New Year's Day, 1917, Major MacDonald was decorated by the King with the Distinguished Service Order, "for distinguished conduct and constant good service at the front from the 16th of June, 1915, to the 20th of August, 1916. This officer did excellent work at Messines. On four separate occasions he, with a small party, bombed enemy working parties in their own wire and in their parapet, twice placing ammonium bombs (torpedoes) in the German wire, exploding it—then bombing the enemy party who came out to reconnoitre the damage done. On one occasion after bombing the reconnoitering party, he rushed forward through a very heavy fire of bombs and machine guns and personally captured a slightly wounded German from whom valuable information was obtained. On Observatory Ridge and Hill 662 on June 13th and 14th, 1916, he showed great ability and coolness in consolidating the newly won position, with 60 per cent. of his company new, having just joined the battalion on the previous night. This was done under an intense barrage covering the whole 24 hour tour. On Hill 60 during the last tour of the 1st Canadian Division in the salient, Major MacDonald was in command of the front line company and organized a raid which was successfully carried out against the enemy's trenches. During the 24 hour tour, September 22nd and 23rd, and again on September 26th and 27th, 1916, in Moquet Farm, Courcellette and during the offensive operations, Major MacDonald displayed exceptional coolness and ability in the handling of his company. The consistent good work of this officer during his fifteen months in the trenches cannot be overstated."

Norman Phillips McLeod, M. C.

Norman McLeod enlisted at Fredericton in November, 1914, as lieutenant in the 2nd Divisional Ammunition Column. He trained at Fredericton and sailed from Canada July 13th, 1915. After spending three months at Oterpool Camp, Shorncliffe, England, he crossed to France in September. In March, 1916, he was promoted to captain. He transferred to the 1st Heavy Battery, which has been in all the heavy fighting. Taking part in the battle of Passchendaele in October, 1917, Captain McLeod won the Military Cross.

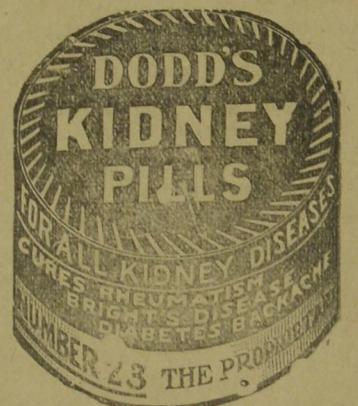

## GERMAN AGENT UNDER ARREST IN NEW YORK

New York, March 11.—In Wilhelm Korehaus, arrested here two weeks ago on a warrant and confined today in the Tombs as a dangerous enemy alien, pending a final disposition of his case, Federal officials said tonight they believed they had found an agent sent to this country from Brazil in 1914 by the German government.

At the time of his arrest, it was learned tonight, Korehaus was occupying an apartment in this city overlooking the Hudson river, where American craft were accustomed to anchor.

Powerful field glasses and three cameras were found in the apartment, it was said, and the authorities were informed that he had displayed great anger on one occasion when a maid entered his room suddenly and found him arranging pictures he is credited with having taken. When he was arrested, however, no pictures were discovered among his effects.
