

## TWO SUSPECTS HELD AT SYDNEY FOR MURDER

No Charge Laid Yet---Joseph Younan, a Syrian, was Killed in His Store Late Monday Night---The Men Arrested are Michael Ryan and John J. Hennessey.

Sydney, May 9. — At 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon two men had been arrested on suspicion of having murdered Joseph Younan in his store on the night of May 6 and by 6 o'clock it had been decided that while neither one of the accused was connected with the murder, further developments as a result of their arrest might occur.

The second man to be arrested was Michael Ryan, who was taken at 5 o'clock by Chief of Police McCormick and Inspector Floyd, at the plant of the By-Products Coke Company. Ryan is a Nova Scotian about thirty-three years of age, but while he appeared nervous on being arrested, he is not believed to be the man wanted it was decided after closely questioning him.

The first man to be arrested as reported was John James Hennessey of New Waterford. Both Ryan and Hennessey are being held until this morning when they will probably be released.

In both cases the arrests were made as the result of descriptions of men supplied by Syrians, who declared that they looked like men who had been hanging around the store during the day the murder was committed. A Syrian boy told the police that a man had visited the store on four different occasions.

### Mysterious from Start.

With only a blue mask, a cap a revolver and a vague description of the gunman as clues, the city police had a difficult task from the start to discover the man who at 11.40 o'clock Monday night shot and killed Joseph Younan.

Although a number of persons heard the shot fired, no person obtained a full view of the gunman. Two reasons are given for the murder. The first view, that of enmity, is set aside by everyone who was intimately acquainted with Mr. Younan. The other reason, that of robbery, is believed to a certain extent. It is stated by Louis Moroun, cousin of the deceased, that he carried betw'n \$200 and \$300 on his person for paying on his house.

### Suspicious Character About.

That the murder was thoughtfully planned is evidenced from the statement of Mrs. James McNeill, 180 Townsend street. Mrs. McNeill told a reporter that on returning home at 9.10 o'clock Monday night she was startled by a man who was in the field opposite Mr. Younan's store. Three times she saw him sneaking in a crouching attitude and looking into the windows of the store. When other men appeared in the street the man ran and hid behind the fence in the field. She did not cause an alarm as she believed the man to have the intention of holding up passing women. During the night she and her husband heard a shot fired but they did not leave their house. She could give no description of the man as it was dark and she could not see him distinctly.

### Had Blue Mask On.

Angus McLeod, who has lived over the store for about a year, told a reporter that he ran down stairs when he heard the shot. He was intimately acquainted with Mr. Younan. "Joe was conscious," he stated, "and as I believed that he was going to die soon, I tried to get all the information I could from him. When I asked him who did the shooting he said that he saw the man, but the man had something black on his face. He was shot in the lower left side, but was not bleeding much. The man had come behind the counter and poking a gun at Joe, ordered him to hold up his hands. Joe thought he was fooling and the man struck him in the face, and right afterwards fired.

"When I asked Joe who did the shooting he said that he could not understand why it was done. He said that he had no enemies that he knew of. He knew that he would die, as he said a couple of times, 'I'm done.' I telephoned Dr. John McDonald and the police."

ed the field through which the gunman had run and found a piece of blue cloth which had been used as a mask. The cloth was large enough to cover the face and had holes for the eyes. Another man found a cap. The revolver, which had two empty shells in it and was of 38 calibre, was found by W. Ferguson, 181 Prince street, on the railway track, when he was going to his work at Chapell's factory.

Although three freight trains left the city between midnight Monday and 8.45 o'clock Tuesday morning, it is believed by the police that the murderer still is in Sydney. Chief of Police McCormick has wired to Louisville, Point Tupper and other towns giving the description of the man as he has it. That the man is 5 feet 8 inches or 5 feet 9 inches and weighs (Continued on page 3.)

## NOTICE
