## HUN PEACE PROPOSALS.

The proposal of the new German Chancellor for an armistice is unanimously rejected by the leading newspapers of the United States. From all over the country the newspapers voice the demand that no peace shall be considered by the Allies until Germany lays down her arms as a token of unconditional surrender. Here are some press opinions and they undoubtedly voice the sentiments of Canadians as well as Americans:

New York World: Press reports give sufficient evidence that the military rulers of the Central Empires at last realize to some extent the judgment that is hanging over them. To save what it can from the wreck—what further motive can have inspired the German government and its Austrian vassal in renewing so soon and in phrases so little changed, a proposal for a negotiated peace? The answer, we believe, is that autocracy is whipped and knows it is whipped. Autocracy will be heard again and again with increasing humility before it finally sues for terms.

New York Herald: "The hit dog yelps. From Berlin and Vienna come simultaneously peace wails, with the exhausted Turk echoing a feeble 'me too.' What Prince Maximilian asks and all he asks is 'peace by negotiations,' a Prussian peace—an armistice. It is the same old trap. There will be no armistice, no negotiations until Germany prefaces its plea with unconditional surrender. We have just begun to fight."

New York Tribune: We have laid down one condition of war—one only—and that is to us force, force to the utmost, force without stint or limit, until we shall have destroyed forever in this world the indecent, intolerable, criminal thing that now holds out its dripping hand. Tell your people that, Prince Maximilian of Baden, and if they can understand, an epoch may begin.

It is not usually customary to make peace with an outlaw and murderer. As a rule he either surrenders unconditionally, or is taken by force. He is then given a fair trial before a jury of his peers, and if found guilty a punishment to fit the crime is meted out to him. No deviation from the established rule should be made by the Allies in dealing with the dirty, miserable, low-down murderers of Germany.

## PULLING TOGETHER.

Toronto Saturday Night: Previous to the opening of the Knights of Columbus Dominion wide campaign for war funds, a series of meetings of a large organizing committee were held in Toronto. The committee which undertook to conduct the campaign, it may first be noted, was considerably upward of 50 per cent. Protestant; and that committee met, where do you suppose? In the Knights of Columbus Hall, of course. It did not; it met in the Y. M. C. A. building, no less. If this war has taught anything it is religious toleration. The Protestant soldier has found on the battlefield as well as in the rest camp behind, that the Catholic priest is not such a bad fellow after all. While on the other hand the Catholic soldier has discovered that a man's religion has nothing to do with the hearty welcome he receives at the hands of his Protestant brothers. It is predicted here and now that the Knights of Columbus war chest will, when the time comes, receive even more than its full share from "Protestant, Tory, Orange, Toronto." (Here in Fredericton the most successful team in the K. of C. drive was composed of a past county master of the L. O. A. and a prominent Hibernian.)

There will be universal sympathy extended to Mr. and Mrs. F. B. Edgcombe over the sad news conveyed in a cablegram from England that their son, Flight Lieut. Charles H. Edgcombe, had been killed while making a practice flight. Lieut. Edgcombe, after a successful course at an aviation

school in Ontario, went overseas the early part of last month to do his bit for King and country, and while the fates had not willed that he should meet the German foe, nevertheless he died a hero's death. Lieut. Edgcombe before volunteering for active service, was associated with his father in the dry goods business. He was a young man of splendid qualities, a keen sportsman and all round good fellow, whose untimely death will be mourned by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance.

A London cable says that Von Hindenburg has quit as chief of the German general staff after a stormy interview with the Kaiser.

## TOWN COUNCIL OF MARYSVILLE

notify the overseer of the poor for the Parish of Blackville that a resident of this town who had lately removed here from that place was liable to become a town charge and that the proper authorities would be expected to look after the case.

Coun. MacPherson then introduced the main object of the meeting with a motion for the re-consideration of a motion passed at the last monthly meeting of the board which called for the resignation of the Town Marshal.

## Out of Order

The Mayor stated that in his opinion this motion was entirely out of order no mention of same having been contained in the notice calling the meeting and the minutes of the former meeting not having been read the matter could not be dealt with until such minutes had been read at a regular monthly meeting and either approved or rejected.

Coun. Stephenson charged the Mayor with holding up the business of the meeting to which assertion the Mayor replied that he had a perfect right to point out to the Council any matters which he considered not in order and that he intended to exercise this privilege as he desired.

Coun. Sloat stated that he considered the motion out of order but in order to overcome any difficulty he would as one who had voted in the affirmative in the original motion, move for a reconsideration of the matter referred to. This motion was seconded by Coun. MacPherson.

The Mayor hesitated about putting this motion to the meeting as he considered it strictly out of order on the grounds already stated.

Coun. MacPherson stated that if no business could be proceeded with he would move for an adjournment. His motion was seconded by Coun. Sloat. Different members of the board then commenced a storm of protest to the methods which were being adopted and the Town Clerk was called upon for an expression of opinion.

## Clerk's Opinion

The latter stated that in his opinion any business could be dealt with as the notice had called for the consideration of general business but that a motion to adjourn had been made which of course was not debatable. The motion was then put to the meeting and carried the real objective of the meeting not having been realized.

## After Meeting

The proceedings did not culminate with the adjournment of the meeting however as the members of the board and a large number of spectators gathered outside the building and indulged in a free-for-all row, during the course of which the Mayor was subjected to some bitter attacks by a member of the Council who accused the former of being partisan another of the board using language which was certainly not in keeping with his dignity as a member of the Town Council. Coun. Sloat suggested that a meeting of the road committee be held which was accordingly done and with this the proceedings terminated.


