

## PRICE OF LAMBS IN ONTARIO IS VERY HIGH

**PURCHASES FOR N. B.  
HAVE BEEN COMPLETED**

**Remarkably High Yield of Oats  
at Nashwaak Village—De-  
partment's Seed Pro-  
duced 21 to 1.**

Thomas Hetherington, Livestock Superintendent of the Provincial Department of Agriculture, arrived here yesterday after being in Ontario for some weeks buying lambs for breeding purposes in this province. All the stock he purchased was loaded at Toronto before he left. He purchased all the rams ordered but did not buy all the ewes on account of the high prices asked in the Ontario market. Prices for ram lambs in that province run from forty to seventy five dollars with similar prices for ewes. By agreement between the Livestock Division Dominion Department of Agriculture and the New Brunswick Department these lambs will be sold to the farmers of New Brunswick at twenty-five dollars for ram lambs and thirty dollars for shearlings. Mr. Hetherington is at Harvey Station today buying grade ewe lambs.

### Fine Production of Oats

Coun. D. H. Clarkson of Nashwaak Village has reported to the Department of Agriculture a yield of oats which is remarkable. Coun. Clarkson last spring planted twenty and a half bushels of seed oats supplied by the Department of Agriculture. The yield from that was four hundred and thirty bushels, about twenty one to one. This yield will stand some beating. All along the Nashwaak excellent yields are reported from the government seed grain.

Dr. Foster is an uncle of the deceased.

### Eggs On Exhibition

A dozen Barred Plymouth Rock eggs are on exhibition in the window of the Board of Trade rooms Queen Street. The eggs were laid by pullets hatched and raised by Hazen Reed of No. 1 Rollingdam Station, Charlotte County, from the eggs of bred-to-lay strains imported by the Poultry Division of the Department of Agriculture. The pullets were hatched on May 10th and were laying on September 20th. This shows what good stock, good care and free range will do for the raising of poultry.

## C. H. EDGECOMBE REPORTED KILLED IN ACCIDENT


**CABLE FROM LONDON  
TODAY CONVEYED NEWS**

**Family Did Not Know He Had  
Reached England—Details  
of Airplane Accident  
Not Known.**

Mr. Fred B. Edgecombe of this city this morning received the sad news that his eldest son Flight Lieut. Charles H. Edgecombe had been killed in an airplane accident in England. The blow to the family of the young aviator was a most severe one as it was not known that he had arrived in England the official word of his death being the first notification.

### At Summer Residence

Mr. Edgecombe and his family are still at their summer residence, Springhill. The cablegram this morning announcing Lieut. Edgecombe's death was not received before the store of the F. B. Edgecombe Co. was

opened but it was closed soon afterward. The family of the deceased is prostrated by the sad news.

### No Details Given

No details were contained in the cablegram which was from the Secretary of the Air Ministry, London. Sympathy was expressed with the bereaved family and the statement made that Lieut. Edgecombe had met his death in an airplane accident.

### Entered Air Service Last Year

The deceased entered the Royal Air Service about a year ago and trained at Toronto and in the United States, qualifying as an officer during the past summer. He was at his home on leave for some time his last visit being during August. In September he left for Montreal to proceed overseas

## DOW WING NOT TO BE USED FOR INFLUENZA

**TRUSTEES REFUSE  
REQUEST OF MILITARY**

**Capacity of Victoria Hospital  
Not Equal to the Demands  
Made—Other Business  
Considered.**

Hon. Judge Crockett, president, occupied the chair at the meeting of the Victoria Hospital Trustees yesterday, and the other members in attendance included Vice President Hawkins, Coun. Pickard, Mr. Kitchen, Dr. Kierstead, and the Secretary-Treasurer.

These are busy days at the hospital and for some time past it has been "first come first served" for the demand for admission has been beyond the capacity of the institution. Some of the disappointed ones seem inclined to blame the trustees for not erecting an additional building, but the financiers of the Board seem to have all their available energy focussed upon meeting the bills for supplies. The splendid staff of young ladies on the floor at all hours must naturally be heard from in these days of rush and high cost of living and sent a formal note to the Trustees yesterday. The letter proved in a measure successful for the Secretary-Treasurer was authorized to enlarge those cheques a little next time.

### Reserving Dow Wing

The president stated he had a request from the military authorities, through Major Ludon, for accommodation in the Dow Wing for four of the lady nurses on the staff of the military hospital who are under treatment for Spanish Influenza. It was found after

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his father saying goodbye to him there it was understood that his sailing was deferred but evidently not as long as had been thought. There was no announcement of his arrival in England.

### Prominent Young Man

The late Lieut. Edgecombe was one of Fredericton's prominent young men. He was twenty-eight years of age and at the time of joining the R. A. F. was secretary-treasurer of the F. B. Edgecombe Company, the largest dry goods firm of Fredericton. He was a member of Hiram Lodge, A. F. & A. M., and was well known throughout New Brunswick and elsewhere as a motorist.

### Surviving Relatives

The deceased is survived by his parents, two sisters Mrs. R. N. MacCunn and Miss Frederica Edgecombe and one brother Emerson now at Rothesay Collegiate School. He was one of six of the name of Edgecombe all related, serving in the present war.
