## CANADA'S VICTORY LOAN IS OVER SUBSCRIBED

New Brunswick Has Bettered Its Allotment by About Three Million Dollars—York County Stands Next to St. John—Work of the Canvassers was Greatly Handicapped by the Epidemic of La Grippe—A Splendid Showing.

St. John, Nov. 18.—No more convincing evidence of the loyalty, to say nothing of the prosperity of the people of New Brunswick could be found than is shown in the figures which have been issued at the close of the Victory Loan campaign. New Brunswick answered the call of the dominion the empire and the men who have borne the burden of the fighting overseas and their answer is a magnificent one. Instead of the \$13,000,000 which was set as the objective, and which some doubted would be secured, the total will be well over \$16,000,000. The province wins the governor-general's flag by a wide margin and when the figures are complete it is believed that they will show that New Brunswick is entitled also to a crown, signifying that the total is twenty-five percent greater than the amount set as the objective.

When the effects of the epidemic are taken into consideration, with the banning of public meetings and limiting the participation in the campaign either as canvassers or subscribers of many citizens, the results secured are more creditable than is shown even by the magnificent figures of the totals.

To the city and county of St. John must be given full credit for the splendid results. In this district the amount raised and the number of applicants were far greater than half of the amount and the number for the rest of the province.

The figures are still incomplete but the returns to Friday night show a total of \$9,532,100 for the province, outside of St. John, and \$6,022,450 for this district, the number of applications signed in St. John being 10,424. When the returns are complete it is expected that the province will show a total of at least \$16,000,000 with 19,000 applicants, and that St. John will have passed the mark of \$6,250,000.

One day last week we got a shock. Into our office tripped the youngster with his cap tilted rakishly over one ear.

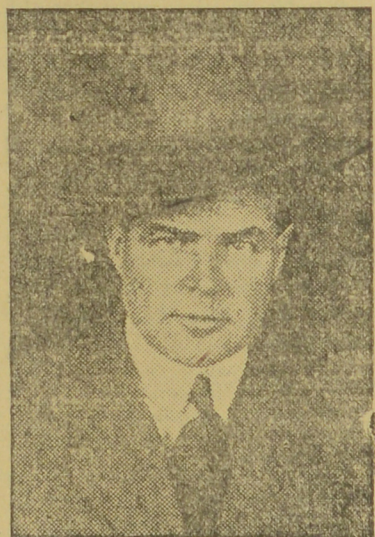
"What's the matter, kid?" we enquired. "Getting the flu?" "Nope," and he brisled out again without troubling to explain. But we have just discovered the truth.

There are whispers going down the line that sedate firemen and brakemen and conductors all over the 18,600 miles and more of the C. P. R. are giving their headgear a shove to the east.
