THE MATTER OF MIXING.

There are Too Many Old-Time Ideas Adhered To.

There are still, you know, housewives who feel that there is a virtue in spending an hour on one batch of mayonnaise. They cannot entirely analyze their feeling on the subject save that they are convinced that to beat in every drop separately is the "right way" and that if they literally do beat in every drop separately they need an hour to do it.

Yet they will eat mayonnaise with a relish at another woman's house where the making has taken scarcely fifteen minutes and where, after the dressing has given an indication that it is going right, the oil is added, a teaspoonful at a time.

It is simply that there is a right way and a wrong way and they persist in doing it quickly the right way.

Now, there are cooks who think that a cake must be made by creaming the butter and sugar together first until it is creamy in appearance. This takes a long time. They hold to the theory that the yolk of the egg should be added with the milk, but that the white must be beaten very stiff and added last. The baking powder should be sifted with the flour and put in just before the egg white.

Try Quicker Methods.

Now, perhaps the texture of the cake made this way is slightly finer than that of cake made in a quicker way, but in these war days the housewife naturally asks herself whether she has any right to spend time doing everything in this long old-fashioned way. Is the difference worth it?

There is a very good cake recipe used by a group of busy housewives that can be mixed in a twinkling. All the dry ingredients are put in a bowl then the milk and unbeaten eggs and melted butter or cooking oil and other ingredients are added and the mixture is made by a few rapid turns of a heavy egg-beater. Presto, change! The cake is ready for the oven. Now that cake comes out very nicely and it takes but a fraction of the time the old-fashioned cake would take.

EXTENSION OF TICKETS

Teachers, students teachers and students at collegiate institutes are notified that arrangements have been made by Honorable Premier Foster, representing the Board of Education, with the Canadian Pacific and Canadian Government Railways, to grant extension on return portions of round trip thirty-day tickets held by bona-fide teachers and scholars who have been detained beyond the limit on account of the prevailing influenza epidemic.

It will be necessary for teachers and students when returning to re-opened schools to present the return portion of ticket to the Station Agent with credentials that they are bona-fide teachers or students, when a free ticket will be issued to each, good only for prompt passage.

NEW GERMAN CHANCELLOR NOT ANTI-MILITARIST

London, Nov. 11—Americans should not jump to the conclusion that 'Fritz' Ebert the socialist chancellor of the German regency is an antimilitarist and an enemy of war. The 47 years old Heidelberg harnessmaker whom the whirligig of war so dramatically tossed into the place from which Bismarck once ruled Germany was an unreserved supporter of Germany's war from the outset. He was one of the socialist majority which cheered itself hoarse on Aug. 4 1914 when Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg proclaimed that necessity knew no law and that Germany was hacking her way through Belgium in flagrant violation of international law.

Voted for All War Credits

Friedrich Ebert cast his vote on every occasion for the \$25,000,000,000 in war credits which the Hohenzollerns used up in their baffled attempt to enslave civilization. In December 1915, when twenty antiwar members of the socialist party in the reichstag seceded from the party organization it was Ebert who publicly rebuked them. He declared that it was the sacred duty of the united German nation to support the government's "war of self-defense." Later Ebert introduced the fruitless resolution to banish Haase, Liebknecht, Ledebour, Dittman, Bernstein, and other independent socialists from further membership in the parliamentary group. A few weeks afterward he was himself elected to succeed Haase as chairman of the group.

Ebert, whose name is pronounced as if it began with the first letter of the alphabet, is the son of a tailor. Beginning life as a saddler's apprentice he afterward was editor of a Bremen socialist newspaper and secretary of a trade union. Then he joined the executive committee of the socialist national organization. In 1913 he became chairman of the party.

No Love for Hohenzollern

The German socialists have de-throned William II., with great satisfaction. They have been his sworn enemy ever since at the late Friedrich Alfred von Krupp's funeral in 1902 the kaiser denounced the social democrats as "wretches without a country." They did not lend their support to the Hohenzollerns war out of any affection for that defunct dynasty. As the political representatives of the German working classes they gleefully made common cause with the militarists and industrialists, who hoped in consequence of a short, sharp, decisive campaign to enrich Germany beyond their wildest dreams.

Fritz Ebert incarnates the spirit in which the "German people" accepted the war. His latest pre-chancellors utterance in the reichstag was his whine against peace terms which would cripple Germany's power to resume her ruthless and rapacious designs on world trade.

RECIPES FOR COOKING

Hominy Bread.

1 c hominy
1 c flour
4 tsp baking powder
½ tsp salt

1 c sweet milk,
1 tbs sugar
1 egg
1 tsp fat

Blend dry ingredients; beat the egg, add the milk; add dry ingredients and melted fat; beat well; bake in a bread pan in a moderate oven.

Liberty Muffins.

1 c buckwheat flour
1 c oat flour,
2 tbs sugar,
1 tsp salt
3 tsp baking powder
½ tsp cloves

½ tsp cinnamon
½ tsp ginger,
1 c milk
1 egg
½ c raisins or dates (cut)
2 tbs fat

Blend dry ingredients; add milk, beaten egg, finely cut fruit, melted fat; beat well; bake in greased muffin tins in hot oven 25-30 minutes.

Corn Bread.

¼ c sugar
2 tbs fat
1 egg
Two-thirds c cornmeal

1 c milk
1 c fine dry bread crumbs
4 tsp baking powder
1 tsp salt

Cream sugar and fat; add egg yolk; add blended dry ingredients alternately with the milk; fold in stiffly beaten egg white; bake in shallow well greased pan in a moderate oven.

Bran Oatmeal Cookies.

(90 Cookies)

1½ c bran
2 c rolled oats
2 c whole wheat flour
1¼ c brown sugar
2 tbs molasses
2 eggs
½ c sweet milk

1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. cinnamon
½ tsp. allspice
¼ tsp. cloves
Nutmeg
1 c raisins (chopped)
1 c melted fat

Mix flour, bran, oats, salt, spice and sugar; stir in raisins, add soda dissolved in milk; then stir in melted fat; add well beaten eggs and molasses. Drop on well greased pans and bake in moderately hot oven.

Buckwheat Cookies.

1 c fat
1 c sugar
1¼ c buckwheat
2 eggs

1 tsp. baking powder
½ tsp. cinnamon
¼ tsp. cloves
Nutmeg

Beat eggs, add sugar and melted shortening; beat until thoroughly mixed; sift dry ingredients and add very slowly; roll thin and bake.

Sure-to-Like Cookies

1 c. sugar
1 c. fat
1 c. molasses
1 c. hot water
1¼ tsp. soda

1 tsp. salt
2 tsp. cinnamon
2½ c. buckwheat flour
2½ c. rye flour
1 c. rolled oats

Cream shortening and sugar together, add molasses, hot water and the sifted dry ingredients. Mix well and allow to stand in a cool place over night. Drop by spoonfuls on a greased pan and bake in a moderate oven. This recipe makes at least 50 cookies.

Barley Brittles.

½ c. fat
1 c. brown or maple sugar
½ c. sour milk
1 tsp. salt

½ tsp. soda
½ tsp. mixed spices
About 2½ c. barley flour

Cream together fat and sugar, add the sour milk and 1 c barley flour mixed with salt, soda and spices; add enough flour to make a dough stiff enough to roll; roll wafer thin, cut in squares or diamonds, dust with sugar and nutmeg and bake in a crisp oven.

Bachelors' Buttons.

¼ c fat
½ c. sugar
1 egg well beaten

2 tbs. cocoa
½ tsp. baking powder
Two-thirds c. rice flour

Mix in the order given and drop from a teaspoon on greased pans. Bake in a moderate oven.
