TRANSPORT AT HALIFAX WITH TROOPS

Halifax, Nov. 28.—The Cunard liner Aquitania, 46,000 tons, arrived here this morning from England with 140 officers and 3,300 non-com's and men of the C. E. F., and 60 civilian passengers. The steamer docked at Pier 2, North Terminals. The soldiers are mostly convalescents from wounds and sickness. The military transport authorities have arranged for their prompt despatch to their various military districts. The citizens of Halifax plan to give the men a warm welcome and reception committees are on hand to look after them.

HAMBURG SOLDIERS AND WORKMEN PROMOTING BOLSHEVIK IDEAS

Hamburg, Nov. 27.—Foreign Secretary Solf has brought the charge that the Hamburg soldiers' and workmen's council is in constant communication with the Russian soviet government. This charge appears to be based on the fact that the marines in charge of the wireless station here are constantly interchanging messages with the Bolsheviks, whose radiograms are promptly reproduced in the official organ, the "Red Flag" for propaganda purposes. The extreme radicals in Hamburg are now in editorial control of the "Red Flag," which they purpose devoting to the exploitation of Bolshevik propaganda.

Indications point to an early rupture between the Independent Socialists and the Spartacus group in Hamburg. The former are showing an inclination to refuse to co-operate longer with the radicals. The Hamburg Echo, organ of the Social Democrats, claim that the soldiers and laborers are threatening to refuse to work on any ships which are likely to be equipped for trips to the United States for the purpose of transporting food. The Spartacists are said to be responsible for the effort to incite a strike.

QUAINT ENGLISH VILLAGE BEREFT OF YOUNG MEN

Women, Girls, Children and Old Men are Seen in Potten End, But No Young Men.

Village of Potten End Hertfordshire, Eng.—The English countryside is today just as quaint and peaceful and beautiful as ever. But it has lost its young men.

On the village green last night the countryfolk gathered at sundown as they have done for several centuries. The duckpond in the middle of the green; the Red Lion Inn (200 years old), tight in a hedgewell on the south the squat little church steeple just over the hedge on the north; and the heathery moor to the west—all were just as they were before the war, except.

There were no young men. They who came together on the green were women, girls, children, old men and occasionally a man of 50. The sober-faced young women were pushing baby carriages.

A motherly women of 60 presided at the bar in the Red Lion (the bar was perhaps four feet long in a room about six feet square). On the right was another brown-walled room with a bare table in the center, a dozen old men were smoking and sipping their ale. At the head of the table, sat a soldier, home on leave.

The innkeeper's daughter was banging a tinny piano in the tiny parlor. She played to an empty room—and to a soldier's picture above the instrument.

The Inn is a squat little place, mostly grown to roof and many-barreled chimneys (the kind you used to see in your Mother Goose book, with storks standing on them). The cracks between the brick shingles are stuffed with moss.

A wooden tablet nailed to the wall of the village church—by the door—displays the "Roll of Honor." Underneath on a little wooden shelf a few sprays of flowers tell their story.

It was a Hertfordshire regiment, with its quota from Potten End, which was practically wiped out at Gallipoli.

From the common this morning one could see squads of Women's Land Army girls, in khaki, sowing wheat in the hedge-grained fields.

Behind, the roofs and chimneys of the village were just visible over the masses of trees, shrubs, and hedges which form the basis of every English landscape. In every one of those homes was one, perhaps two, three or four, empty chairs, many of which would never be filled.

A crowd of girls was blackberrying among the brambles and bracken on the moor.

Lover's Lane, smooth and grassy between high hedge walls, was empty. A tiny girl in gingham and a bit of a boy with yellow curls were marching, hand in hand, into its far end.

CANADIANS ARE HAVING A GOOD TIME

Gold Medal Presented to Sir Arthur Currie by City of Mons—Plans for Demobilization.

With the Canadian Corps, Nov. 28.—(By J. F. B. Livesay, Canadian Press Correspondent)—Before leaving Mons which the Canadians captured just before the armistice was signed, Sir Arthur Currie, the commander of the Canadian corps, was presented by the city with a medal in gold specially struck in his honor and inscribed as a souvenir of the occupation of the city by the Canadian corps. Replicas will be distributed among the troops who participated.

Men of the first Canadian division were given a great reception upon their entry into the city of Nivelles on their march to Germany.

Leisure has been granted the men for visits to Waterloo and the historic battlefields in the neighborhood and a considerable contingent of Canadian officers attended the official entry of the King and Queen of the Belgians into Brussels.

The published plan for the demobilization of the Canadian army has not been received with enthusiasm as the men hoped and believed that they would have an opportunity of returning to their bases as members of the fighting units with which they have so
