DEATH ROLL FOR OFFICIAL YEAR

SHOWS MARKED INCREASE IN RATE IN CITY OF FREDERICTON

October with Thirty-four Deaths the Record Month—Influenza Responsible for the Increase—Total was 175, an Increase of Thirty-six on the Preceding Year—Record by Months and Individuals.

Returns for the fiscal year ending October 31st last have been prepared by Secretary G. Y. Dibblee of the Fredericton Board of Health. They show that the death rate of Fredericton for the past year was considerably in excess of that of the year previous. This is accounted for largely by the influenza epidemic which began in October. The total number of deaths exceeded the number for the year before by 36.

Returns by Months

The returns by months are as follows: November 8, December 12, January 11, February 16, March 14, April 16, May 16, June 8, July 14, August 13, September 11, October 34. The result of the influenza epidemic is well shown in the large total for October.
