### OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

#### THE POOR PRUNE.

##### Prune Whip.

One cupful of prune pulp, free from  
juice, white of one egg. Place the  
white of egg in the bowl. Rub the  
prunes through a fine sieve. Beat  
with a Dover egg beater until it be-  
comes a thick white meringue.

##### Baked Prunes.

Wash the prunes. Place one pound  
of them in a casserole dish, with two  
cupfuls of cold water. Place in the  
oven overnight, after slackening off  
the fire. In the morning they will be  
deliciously tender and just bursting  
with juice.

##### Prune Bread.

Wash the prunes. Dry and then re-  
move the stones. Chop fine sufficient  
prunes to measure one and a half cup-  
fuls. Now place in a deep bowl.

One and a half cupfuls of mashed  
potatoes, three tablespoonfuls of melt-  
ed shortening, one-half tablespoonful  
of syrup, one-half cupful of water, 80  
deg. Fah., two tablespoonfuls of salt.  
Mix and add one yeast cake, crumbled  
fine. Beat for three minutes to dis-  
solve the yeast cake.

Now add one cupful of rye flour, one  
cupful of cornmeal, sufficient whole  
wheat flour to make a stiff dough.

Set aside in a warm place for three  
hours to rise; then add the prepared  
prunes. Knead to distribute prunes.  
Mold into loaves weighing 20 ounces  
each. Place in well greased pans, let  
rise for one hour, then bake for forty  
minutes, reducing the heat the last 15  
minutes.

##### Prune Brown Betty.

Remove stones from one half pound  
of cooked prunes. Add one half cup-  
ful of prune juice, one half cupful of  
syrup, one half teaspoonful of nutmeg,  
one and a half cupfuls of fine bread  
crumbs, one well beaten egg. Mix,  
pour into a baking dish, bake for 30  
minutes in a moderate oven. Serve  
with prune whip.

#### A BROWN BREAD RECIPE.

Sift together one cup of cornmeal  
with one cup of graham flour. Dissolve  
one teaspoon of soda in one tablespoon  
of boiling water and add to it one and  
two-thirds cup of thick sour milk and  
one-third of a cup of molasses. Then  
add a teaspoon of salt and the sifted  
flour. Pour into a greased mold and  
steam for four hours. Then bake for  
20 minutes.
