ALLIED TROOPS ACHIEVE FURTHER SUCCESSES

The Fall of Valenciennes is Believed to be Imminent---The Huns Battling Hard to Keep the Allies From Outflanking Tournai --- Belgians Cross the Lys Canal on Their Entire Front

New York, Oct. 22—The Associated Press tonight issued the following: The fall of Valenciennes to Field Marshal Haig's forces is imminent. Despite the desperate resistance of the Germans the British have entered the city on the west while to the north they have made a deep thrust into the great Raismes Forest and are moving in the direction of Conde near the angle of the Scheldt. Valenciennes had been in uninterrupted French possession from 1677, until the on-run of the Germans early in the present war led them many miles into France. It is now about to be added to the rapidly growing list of towns, the redemption of which has brought rejoicing to the French people.

Although the progress of the Allied forces in Belgian and French Flanders has slowed down somewhat in the face of the stiffening of the lines of rear guards aiding the retreat of the German armies, appreciable gains have been made, some of them of much importance. Holiain and Bruyelles on the Scheldt, south of Tournai are now in the hands of the British and north of Tournai the village of Froyenne has been cleared of the enemy who is withdrawing toward the Scheldt.

There has been sharp fighting for the crossings of this waterway at Pont-A-Chin. The Germans are battling hard to keep the Allies from outflanking Tournai on the south. Behind the Scheldt the Germans are massed in strength; their machine guns on the east bank are active and are receiving the support of artillery and trench mortars.

In the northern battle area, the Belgians have reached the Lys Canal along their entire front and have captured a bridgehead with numbers of the enemy west of Meerendre. An item of great interest appears in the latest announcement by the French war office concerning the operations along the Aisne. It says: "The Czech-Slavs with us retook the village of Terron."

The French are still moving actively to the north of Laon and have now completed the occupation of Chalandry and Grandup. To the south west of Ghent they are firmly established on the east bank of the Lys river having made crossings at several points, against which the enemy resisted with determination. Around Lecateau, where Americans are fighting with the British fourth army activity has diminished greatly. The same is true of the American sector northwest of Verdun where the chief activity of the enemy has been the shelling of the American line with mustard and other gas shells and an air raid which came near to achieving the destruction of an American base hospital.

The German reply to President Wilson is still the subject of much comment, newspapers and public alike agreeing that Germany has by no means adequately met the desires of the president and the Allied powers. Official cognizance of the note has not yet been taken by the United States government.

Meanwhile numerous German papers are calling upon the emperor to

eliminate himself from the question and declaring that peace must not be delayed on account of the Hohenzollerns or for other reasons. Winter, unusually late this year has set in on the front in northern Russia, and a prolonged lull is looked for in that territory.

The Kaiser Must Go

Amsterdam, Oct. 22—German provincial and socialist newspapers continue their campaign against the "chief culprits" responsible for the war. The Frankische Tages Post of Nuremberg, the first paper in Germany openly to demand the abdication of the emperor, declares that the accession of the crown prince is entirely out of the question.

"The German people is searching for the guilty," says the Volks Zeitung the organ of the Nuremberg Socialists. "The pan-Germans and Junkers are silent today but we do not forget they are the great war inciters in Germany, that they remain the support of social and political reaction and that they are a menace to the future healthy development of the German empire. The pan-German policy has gone bankrupt, but unfortunately it has led the German people to disaster. To the galleys with the guilty whoever they may be."

The socialist Arbeiter Zeitung of Vienna urges the German socialists to punish the "chief culprits" without mercy adding: "When the German soldiers return home from the trenches after four years of unparalleled suffering there will be a reckoning for the people who have led them to this catastrophe. The German people will sweep away the Junkers and take its own destiny into its own hands."

Other sons are Edward of Couderal, Wis., and Morton of Davenport, Ia. The funeral will take place Thursday at 2 p.m. Rev. Dr. Harrison officiating.

Camphor of No Use

One local druggist stated that it would be as useful to wear a horseshoe nail about the neck and Major A. K. Haywood superintendent of the Montreal General Hospital uses the expression "a string of beads" in the same manner. The use of camphor is no more than a popular superstition the source of which is unknown. It is quite general throughout Canada however and tons of camphor which might have been put to some use have been wasted during the influenza epidemic.
