## GERMANY HAS BITTER CHOICE NOW BEFORE HER

She Can Accept Terms as Severe as Those Given to Austria-Hungary, or Can Continue the War with Defeat Certain in the End—Must Soon Decide — Austria-Hungary Has Lost Practically Everything.

New York, Nov. 4—The Associated Press tonight issued the following.

With Germany's allies vanquished and forced to accept terms for a cessation of hostilities against them tantamount to abject surrender, the die is now to be cast in front of the Hohenzollern dynasty.

The inter-allied conference sitting in Versailles has drawn up the terms under which Germany may have peace. And the indications are that these terms will be no less hard than those imposed upon Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey.

Forsaken by all her champions in arms, Germany the power that hoped to be able to dominate the world by force, is at the threshold of acknowledging defeat by capitulation or continuing a struggle which means her ultimate utter defeat.

The terms accepted by Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria, and Turkey have shorn all these states of power. These imposed upon Germany surely will be no less severe in rendering that country powerless to resume hostilities, even in the far distant future.

### The Fighting

Meanwhile, pending the presentation of the dictum of the Allies, the German armies in Belgium and France are the only ones left of the Teutonic allied group which are under attack. And they are being sorely tried. In the Italian theatre the Austro-Hungarians utterly crushed, having lost thousands of men killed and 30,000 taken prisoner are standing bewildered before the victorious Italian, British, French, American and Czechoslovak armies. Respite from further punishment was given them Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Northern Italy again is Italian and Trent, Trieste and other places which the Italians always have claimed as their own are dominated by the Italians and fly the tricolor of the kingdom.

Almost all of the Adriatic coast line now is in the hands of the Italians and Albania is all but cleared of the defeated Austro-Hungarians. Likewise eastern Serbia is freed of the enemy and a few days more doubtless will see the remainder of the straggling Austro-Hungarians making their way out of the western part of the kingdom across the Save river into their own country. As for Bulgaria and Turkey, they no more are menacing.

Over a front of thirty miles in north western France Field Marshal Haig's armies have delivered a mighty blow against the Germans and torn into their positions over wide fronts, capturing important strategic points of the enemy line and taking more than 10,000 prisoners. Of particular value in the general plan of driving the Germans out of the invaded region was an advance of more than three miles across the Sambre Canal which leaves Field Marshal Haig's men set upon good ground for a further dash eastward.

### Abject Terms

Washington, Nov. 4—Austria-Hungary, the last and most powerful ally of Germany, passed out of the world war today under terms of abject surrender.

Not only have the armed forces of

the once powerful Austro-Hungarian empire laid down their arms to await the end of the war and peace terms dictated by the Allies and the United States, but Austro-Hungarian territory is open for operations against Germany. Even the munitions of the former ally are to be used against the Kaiser's armies if refusal to accept conditions now being prepared for them make prolonged fighting necessary.

### Accepted in the Field

The terms which stopped the victorious advance on the Italian front were accepted by the Austrian commander in chief, in the field, in the name of the Vienna government, and their execution is guaranteed by the thorough beating already administered which had converted the defeated army into a disorganized fleeing horde. Even the terms imposed previously upon Bulgaria and Turkey hardly were so drastic. In addition to all the military precautions, the Austrians are compelled to retire from a wide strip of territory within the borders of their empire, surrendering all of Italia Irredentia and thereby losing any advantage for argument over boundaries around a peace table.

It is understood the terms are to be submitted to Germany immediately, and that their publication in full will follow soon. The statement has been authorized that the drastic conditions under which Austria dropped out of the war today furnish an accurate indication of their nature.

Lest there should be any discordant note during this sickness Dr. McGrath at once sent a musician and had the piano tuned. This accomplished he then sent for the use of the nurses six bottles of port wine, one bottle champagne, two quarts. oysters, two dozen oranges, one box grapes. Other gifts especially for the nurses: Mrs. D. Cummings, two doz. oranges; Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd VanWart, six qts. ice cream; Mrs. J. S. Neill, bread cookies and jelly; Mrs. H. G. Kitchen preserves and rolls; Mrs. Burden, pineapple dessert; Mrs. Davis, one bottle peaches; Mrs. McVey, two loaves brown bread; Mr. Tweeddale, box grapes; Mrs. Chas. H. Weddall, two dishes custard.

The patients were remembered as follows: One quarter of venison, Rev. W. D. Wilson; Mrs. McVey, six jars jelly; Mrs. Spiers, two dressing basins; Mrs. Tracey, four jars jelly; Mr. W. Perkins, two doz. eggs for patients and box grapes for nurses.


### Volunteer Nurses


