WHAT DO CHILDREN DRINK?

Not Enough People Realize the Value of Milk as Both Food and Drink for the Young.

A recent survey in a prosperous and progressive middle western city showed that among 422 children visited, only 58 per cent were receiving fresh milk to drink. Others were being given tea and coffee and even some of the 58 per cent were drinking tea or coffee for breakfast. These children came from all sorts of families, ranging from the wealthiest in the city to the very poorest.

Many well-to-do families apparently believe they are supplying food of other kinds, expensive foods, perhaps, which will take the place of milk. Poor people in their mistaken idea of thrift often start saving by cutting down their milk supply. And so it develops that children are not given as much milk as they need.

It cannot be too often repeated that the lasting results of this great war for democracy depend on what is fed to children. A victory now will be futile if the vigor of the coming generation is not safeguarded. The seriousness of saving people for the future is voiced in the nation wide baby campaign.

Mothers are now beginning to realize that milk for the children is cheap at any price. Milk should be served to both old and young as food, not as a beverage. Even if the increased cost of labor brings the price up, it is an indispensable and comparatively inexpensive article, when its real food value is appreciated.

MOCK SEAM HOSIERY.

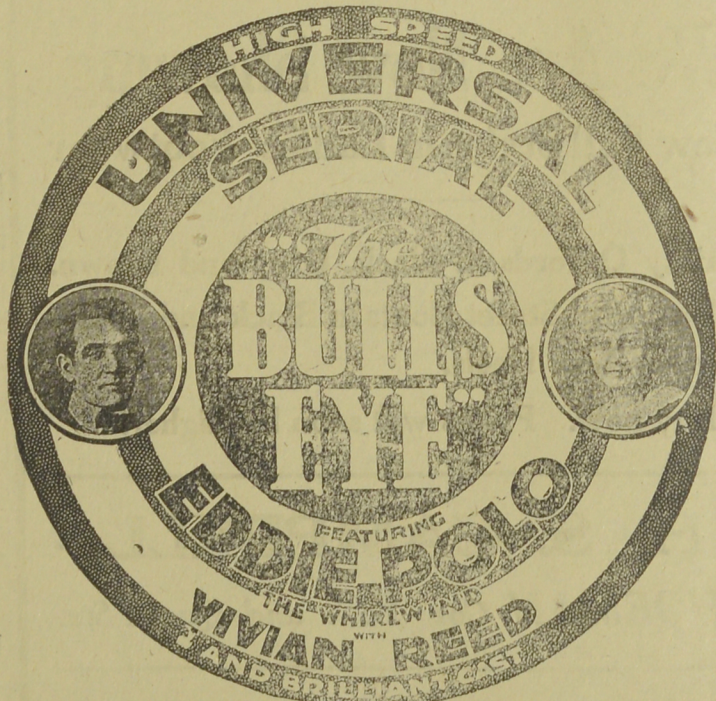
Of course every woman knows that a seam up the back of a silk stocking bespeaks the distinction of that stocking. Seamed stockings, or, as the manufacturer calls them, "full fashioned stockings," are the aristocrats of hosiery. One wears seamless hose that are bound to wrinkle at the ankle sooner or later only when compelled by dire necessity. The shops have been flooded with seamless stockings of late, because now that imports from Germany (where stockings used to come from) have ceased, American mills have not been able to turn out superior full-fashioned hose fast enough to supply the demand.

Then a resourceful woman took a needle and whipped a seam down the back of her despised seamless stocking. Other women followed her bright example. Soon the canny manufacturers discovered the clever ruse.

Now there are machines that put camouflage seams down the back of cheaper grades of silk stockings and the new mock seam hosiery, except for a difference of fit at the ankle, looks quite as well as the more expensive sort.

LABOR MEN ARE MEETING IN QUEBEC

Quebec, Sept. 16.—The thirty-fourth annual convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada was opened this morning in the Columbus Hall, with 418 delegates from all parts of the Dominion in conference.

According to a statement of P. M. Draper, secretary-treasurer of the Congress, the principal subjects to be discussed will be the question of coolie labor in Canada, a question which, Mr. Draper says, is causing real concern to labor men, particularly in the Maritime Provinces. Resolutions will also be submitted asking for the repeal of the Military Service Act and urging the federation of all unions in Canada as a means of meeting capitalism.

Still another question around which much interest centres, is the fight for the presidency. The strongest opponent of J. C. Watters, the present leader of the Congress, is James Simpson, who is supported by the Toronto typographical union. Mr. Simpson is at present in New Zealand, where he is conducting a temperance campaign.
