

The mid-week market was represented by about a dozen country wagons this morning. Meat and potatoes were the chief articles of produce. Beef sold for from 12 cents to 14 cents a pound, pork brought 20 cents a pound. Chickens sold for 30 cents a pound, butter and eggs were not to be seen. Potatoes were boosted up to \$3.25 and sold out at that price. Lamb was sold at \$1.25 to \$2.25 a quarter. Apples sold for \$1.50 to \$3 a barrel. First grade McIntosh Reds brought from \$6 to \$7 a barrel.
