

DEPARTMENTAL EXAMINATIONS ARE BEING HELD

1,000 CANDIDATES ARE WRITING THE PAPERS

Inspector R. D. Hanson is in Charge at Fredericton—The Candidates Here Number 245.

The Departmental Examinations conducted by the Department of Education of New Brunswick began this morning at the fifteen examining stations throughout the province. At Fredericton the examinations are being written at the Normal School with Inspector R. D. Hanson in charge. The total number of candidates is in the neighborhood of one thousand. The examinations will continue until Friday July 5th. The classification is Normal School Entrance, Class I, II and III, Superior Teaching License, University of New Brunswick Matriculation and High School leaving.

Provincial Registration
The Canada Registration Board has issued a regulation that every provincial registrar of births and deaths shall transmit at beginning of each month to the central registrar a return of the name, age and place of residence of every person of 16 years or upwards, whose death shall have been notified to him during the preceding month. Also, the number of deaths under 16 years and the number of births during the same period. Any official who refuses or neglects to perform his duty, under these regulations is liable to a fine not exceeding \$100 and imprisonment not exceeding one month.

DIVORCE COURT OPENED TODAY WITH TWELVE CASES ON DOCKET, ADJOURNED UNTIL TUESDAY NEXT

Four Old Cases from Preceding Term and Eight New Ones—Two of New Cases are Defended and Six are Undefended—No Cases From This Vicinity—St. John Furnishes the Majority of Them.

The July sitting of the New Brunswick Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes began this morning with twelve cases on the docket, a record number. Four are old cases over from a preceding term and eight are new cases. In the absence of Mr. Justice Crockett the registrar, Mr. H. G. Fenety adjourned the court until 11 a. m. Tuesday, July 9th.

A summary of cases filed since January Term follows:
Melissa McMullin vs. William McMullin—Parties belong to Moncton and were married there on June 24th, 1908 by Rev. F. S. Bamford, Baptist, the Plaintiff formerly being a Mrs. McCleave, a widow. Infidelity is alleged against the defendant, committed by defendant while on visits to Halifax. Emma Noyles, Marie McTot, and a girl called "Pearl" are named as co-respondents. Divorce "A Vinculo matrimonii" is asked.
William H. Reid vs. Olivia Reid—Parties from St. Andrews and were married December 25th, 1914 by the Rev. R. W. Weddall, Methodist, the defendant's maiden name being Hume

One Fred Girvan is named as co-respondent. Divorce "A Vinculo matrimonii" sought on usual statutory grounds.

Mary Louise Gormley vs. William Gormley—Parties of St. John, married there on July 5th, 1898 by Rev. R. P. McKim, Episcopalian, the plaintiff before marriage being Martin. Since the marriage the parties have lived both at St. John and Fredericton. In 1901 the plaintiff joined the Roman Catholic Church, her husband's church. Divorce "A mensa et thoro" is asked on the ground of cruelty, neglect and non-support. Two male children were born in wedlock, the former of whom is now serving at the front.

Oscar Herman Trites vs. Annie Evelyn Trites—Parties of Moncton, the defendant formerly Wilson. Married at Lowell, Mass., by the Rev. Orsen E. Malorey, Baptist, on July 18th, 1897. Seven children were the issue of marriage. Several co-respondents are named, including Alfred Leaman, Clifford Steadman, Ernest Lutes, Robert Capson, and William Patriquin. Prayer for divorce "A vinculo matrimonii" on the grounds of unfaithfulness.

Annie Gertrude Burton vs. James Burton—Plaintiff formerly Brown, resides at St. John, defendant now of Missouri, U. S. married at St. John West, on January 12th, 1907 by the Rev. Hedley D. Marr. Issue of marriage a girl. A female called "Jenette" a dancer at the "Cedar Theatre" St. John in 1911, is named as co-respondent. Divorce "A Vinculo matrimonii" is asked.

Maria Hatheway vs. Rainsford Hatheway—The plaintiff before marriage Parish and married to the defendant on September, 1891 at Fort Fairfield, Me., by John P. Trafton, J. P. afterwards resided at Lorne, Victoria County. Nine children were the issue of marriage. The plaintiff alleges that in 1911 that the defendant was indicted for rape and incest and on pleading guilty was sentenced to ten years in the Dorchester Penitentiary, where he now is. The co-respondent named is Queenie Hatheway, the daughter of the parties. Divorce "A vinculo matrimonii" is prayed for by the plaintiff.

George Hetherington vs. Priscilla Hetherington—Parties belong to formerly Donovan. Married at Caribou Me., May 24th, 1903 by Rev. William Kelly, Baptist. No issue. Plaintiff
