

The Guide's Interes

We will now consider conditions from the guide's standpoint, and I will give you a few points, not generally

known by the majority. A guide in order to do a satisfactory busines these times, must be prepared to take his sportsmen from railroad to camp quickly and comfortably. He must have good camps, beds, chairs, cooking outfits, canoes, guides and cooks: he must have good hunting grounds connected by trails or water, where no one else is hunting; he must understand game and know how to get tenderfoot to it; must know how to take care of his sportsman, and send him out satisfied, so he will come again and bring his friends or family. Wood enough to last through the hunting season must be cut and brought to the camps, and supplies be got in before the season opens so that there will be no noise or unnecessary traffic going on while anyone is hunt-
