THE MONT BLANC ENQUIRY RESUMED AT HALIFAX

(Canadian Press direct wire.)

Halifax, Jan. 22. — The inquiry into the collision between the steamers Imo and Mont Blanc which led to the explosion fraught with such tragic consequences, was resumed yesterday before Mr. Justice Drysdale, with Captain Demers, wreck commissioner and Captain Rose, R. N., associated with him as nautical assessors. The counsel in attendance were W. A. Henry, K. C., for the Federal government, H. Mellish, K. C., for the owners of the steamship Mont Blanc, C. J. Burchell K. C., for the owners of the steamship Imo, and Andrew Clune, K. C., for the Provincial government.

At the opening of the proceedings Mr. Justice Drysdale announced that at the instance of the Minister of Marine he characterized as wrong, misleading and compromising statements made as to the responsibility of Captain Rose. That officer was in no way responsible for the movement of ships in Halifax harbor at the time

of the explosion and the report that he was, was wrong. Captain Rose was a member of the court and could continue to sit as such, not having been in any way interested in the movement of ships at the time of the explosion.

[Mr. Mellish, K. C., for the owners of the steamer Mont Blanc, said that some of the witnesses examined had complained to him as to press notices derogatory to them. The case was unlike an ordinary action where the press could be restrained as to comment.

Mr. Justice Drysdale said it was undesirable that statements should be made involving liability. Statements involving liability of one ship or the other should not be made as that was a matter for trial.

Mr. Burchell, K. C., for the owners of the steamer Imo, thought he had more cause for complaint than Mr. Mellish, as statements had gone all over America that the Imo's pilot had been found with two bullets in his head.

MAY AMEND LICENSE ACT

Quebec, Jan. 22. — A Liberal caucus will be held this afternoon. A number of questions will be studied. It is reported that the prohibition issue will be revealed at the caucus and that an especial legislation will be prepared on it. An amendment to the license act will probably be introduced, excepting wine and beer.

CALGARY MAN HAS GOOD IDEA

(Canadian Press direct wire.)

Toronto, Jan. 22. — The News publishes a letter from Mr. W. G. Hunt of Calgary, in which he outlines a plan for getting English-speaking and French-speaking Canadians to understand each other. His proposal is that immediately after the war the Dominion government should set aside \$500,000 annually for 1,600 travelling scholarships to be awarded to highly proficient students in all the provinces. In the English-speaking provinces the scholarships would go to those who made a special study of the French language and took a 10 per cent. higher standing than that required to pass matriculation. In Quebec the scholarships would go to those who took a similar high standing in their work and acquired a working knowledge of English. These scholarships would enable 1,200 of the brightest pupils produced by the English provinces every year to spend several weeks in becoming acquainted with the province of Quebec, its people and its customs.

RELATIONS WITH PERSIA.

(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—In the House of Lords Earl Curzon announced that Great Britain had informed Persia that Britain regarded the Anglo-Russian agreement of 1907 as henceforth to be suspended. He emphasized that Great Britain desired Persia to remain neutral in war time and retain complete independence after the war.
