ills, worthy of some consideration, too? It is he who makes game valuable. If it were not for him there would be no game today because it would not be worth taking care of. They spend about half a million dollars in the province every year and the guides get only a small part of it. The farmer gets his share, so does the hotel man, the grocer, the livery

man, the railroad, etc. It would be a surprise to some farmers to look over the guides' accounts, and see the amount spent for farm produce. The sportsman pays it all and what does he get for his money? A man who is not a sportsman cannot understand what he gets; only a sportsman knows that, and he cannot explain to anyone who has not the right spirit.

If the councillors think the farmers ought to kill game at any time, what about the lumbermen? Are they to have no privileges? Do they never want meat? I see nothing said in their favor.

It is well known that in the settlements and at lumber camps game is killed in season and out of season, regardless of size or age, till it is getting scarce, and about the only place where you will find it plenty now is well back in the woods in places where the guides have been taking care of it. There it is more plentiful than ever for all the non-resident sportsmen kill does not affect the game supply enough to notice.

Give us sensible legislation, fair protection, and we will have a game supply that will be a large asset to the province for many years, but we want no open season in July, August or December.

Announced for New Brunswick's Farmers' Parliament.

The annual meeting of the Farmers' and Dairyman's Association of New Brunswick is to take place in Fredericton on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, March 12th, 13th, 14th and 15th. The sessions probably will be held in the City Hall.

The program will be issued by the secretaries of the society in the near future. The Provincial Department of Agriculture has arranged for a large number of speakers, some of whom are experts in various lines connected with farming and stock raising.

Mr. Isaac W. Baird of Chipman, is the president and will deliver the opening address. The welcome of the City of Fredericton will be extended by the mayor. Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, will address the gathering, also Dr. W. C. Kierstead, deputy for the Food Controller in New Brunswick. Other speakers will be Thomas Hetherington, Live Stock Superintendent for New Brunswick, A. C. McCulloch, Poultry Superintendent for New Brunswick, L. T. Floyd, Apiarist for New Brunswick, Prof. John Trueman of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, Truro, N. S., Dr. P. C. Gaudier of Prince Edward Island, William Kerr of the Live Stock Branch, Charlottetown, G. C. Cunningham, Potato Specialist, Fredericton, B. Leslie Emslie, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, Guy Porter, Potato Shipper, Perth, J. H. Grisdale, Superintendent of Dominion Experimental Farms, W. W. Hubbard, Superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Station, Fredericton, M. A. McLeod, Superintendent of Agricultural Societies for New Brunswick.

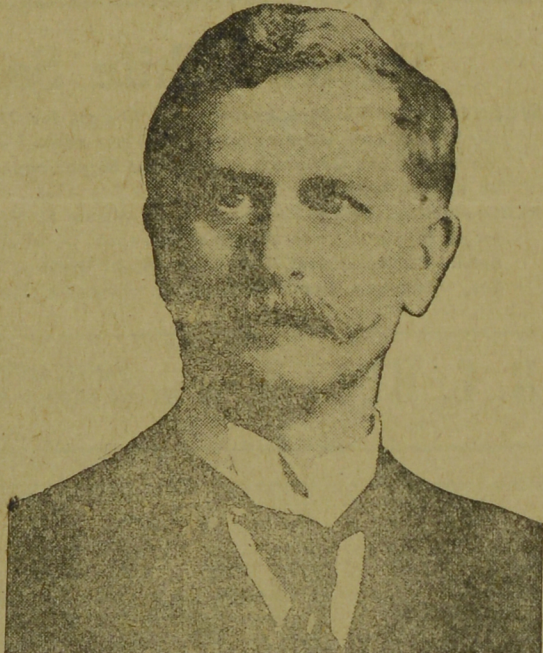

## King Honors C.P.R. Official

SIR Arthur H. Harris, who has been made a Knight Commander of the British Empire for his services in Canada as Director of Overseas Transport, is a son of the late Henry Vinton Harris of Devonport, Devonshire, England. Educated at the Devonport and Stoke Grammar School he came to this country in the seventies, entering the services of the Grand Trunk Railway, and rising to the position of General Freight Agent Through Traffic.

In 1902 he joined the Canadian Pacific Railway since which date to August, 1914, he was actively engaged in initiating traffic for the Company's rail and ocean services.

On the outbreak of the war, the President of the Canadian Pacific offered Mr. Harris' services to the Imperial and Canadian Governments for the purpose of organizing and directing an Overseas Transport Department, the successful administration of which is now recognized by His Majesty.

He is a member of St. James' Club, Montreal; Rideau Club, Ottawa; and the Montreal Royal Golf Club.

In 1888 he married a daughter of the late William B. Lamb, B.C.L., of Montreal, granddaughter of the late Hon. Wm. Morris, at one time Receiver-General of Canada, and niece of the late Hon. Alexander Morris, First Governor of Manitoba and the North West Territories.

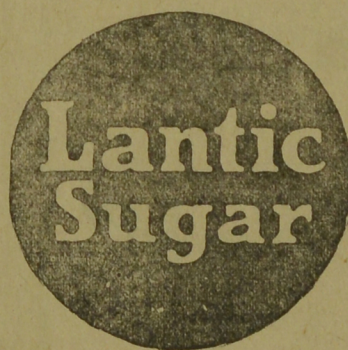
