### OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

HELPFUL HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

To cut hot bread or cake perfect,  
heat the knife.

Put a silver spoon into the most deli-  
cate glass, and boiling hot liquids can  
be poured into it without breaking it.

There will be no trouble in making  
boiled frosting harder if a pinch of  
cream of tartar is added to the beaten  
white of the egg.

To get cake out of the pan whole,  
when taken from the oven set it on a  
wet cloth for five minutes.

To preserve brooms, dip them for a  
minute or two in a kettle of boiling  
suds once a week and they will last  
much longer, making them tough and  
pliable.

To keep a quart of milk sweet, add  
a spoonful of horseradish and it will  
keep for days.

Remove paint from a window with  
hot strong vinegar.

Sweet oil will remove finger marks  
from varnished furniture and kero-  
sene from oiled furniture.

Remove tea and coffee stains with  
boiling water.

TO CLEAN ALUMINUM.

A solution of a tablespoonful of bor-  
ax in water containing a few drops of  
aqua ammonia will clean it.

Another way is to allow an oxalic  
acid solution: One heaping teaspoonful  
of oxalic acid crystals to 1 gallon of  
lukewarm water—to stand in it over  
night; then wash out the utensil thor-  
oughly with clear hot water, rinse and  
use as accusomed.

But more to the point is the fact  
that though a discolored utensil is un-  
sightly in appearance, there is no dan-  
ger whatever in using it. In other  
words the impurities form no poison-  
ous compound with the aluminum.

APPLES—A WINTER STAND-BY.

Don't Peel for Sauce.

When making apple sauce, don't peel  
the apples; you waste the real flavor  
of the fruit, making an insipid sauce.  
Wash the apples, cut in halves, and  
remove the cores from the halves.  
Cook, then press through the fruit or  
potato ricer, which removes the skins  
but leaves that fine flavor which is  
lost by paring the fruit. Then add the  
sugar.

Apple Sauce Without Sugar.

To nearly one quart of chopped ap-  
ples, add one teaspoonful of salt, one  
cupful chopped raisins and four table-  
spoonfuls corn syrup; when done add  
a small piece of butter. This sauce  
can be put in a crust and makes a  
nice pie; add spice if desired.
