TABLE SCRAPS SALVAGED FOR PORK RAISING

Military Hospitals Commission Utilizes the Refuse in Large Convalescent Centres for Hog Feed.

Just as the scraps from the soldiers' meals in the British armies in France are salvaged for nitro-glycerine making fats, and the residue of the refuse sold to the French farmers as feed for their pigs, the refuse from the larger military convalescent hospitals is being utilized in pork production by the Military Hospitals Commission.

There is bound to be a certain margin of food unsuitable for human consumption in any kitchen even where the utmost economy is observed. In communities such as the convalescent centres at Guelph, Whitby and Winnipeg it is sufficient to feed herds of considerable size and the piggeries established are revenue producing "reduction plants."

Practical Experience.

In the agricultural courses offered in the vocational training work at these centres the men take work in animal husbandry, and the piggeries offer practical experience along this line. The system has been under way in Winnipeg for several months. In Whitby the buildings are now in the course of construction. With the population today in considerable excess of 500 patients the Whitby hospital looks toward aiding materially in the increase of pork production.

In other centres the refuse is burned in an incinerator which supplies heat for the kitchen wings of the hospitals and all the hot water used in the institutions. This has effected a great saving in fuel and proven an untold benefit in the coal famine in several instances (7)

70 CENT EGGS BOOM POULTRY COURSE OF M.H.C.

With Every Hen Laying Golden Eggs Return Soldiers Would Take up Poultry.

With eggs selling generally for 70 cents a dozen and a few householders crowing exultantly because they are paying only 50, the excellence of the poultry course offered to the convalescent soldiers by the vocational training branch of the Military Hospitals Commission has much to recommend it even to the city man who never before considered the advisability of raising his own eggs.

To the returned soldier who finds himself unfitted for strenuous work, or bound to some new occupation because of an amputated leg or arm, the poultry course is an open door to independence. The initial outlay is not large and a competent man well trained can see a great future before him.

A Very Complete Course.

He learns everything about poultry from incubation to the building of the best chicken house. The construction of the proper kind of poultry house and fitting it with the right equipment has an important part in his success. This settled he learns the most profitable of the utility breeds and the management of flocks for egg production. Feeds and feeding are given next consideration and finally he learns to market.

Many men have already completed the course and set up in business. They are uniformly successful according to the reports on file at the M.H.C. headquarters. (8)

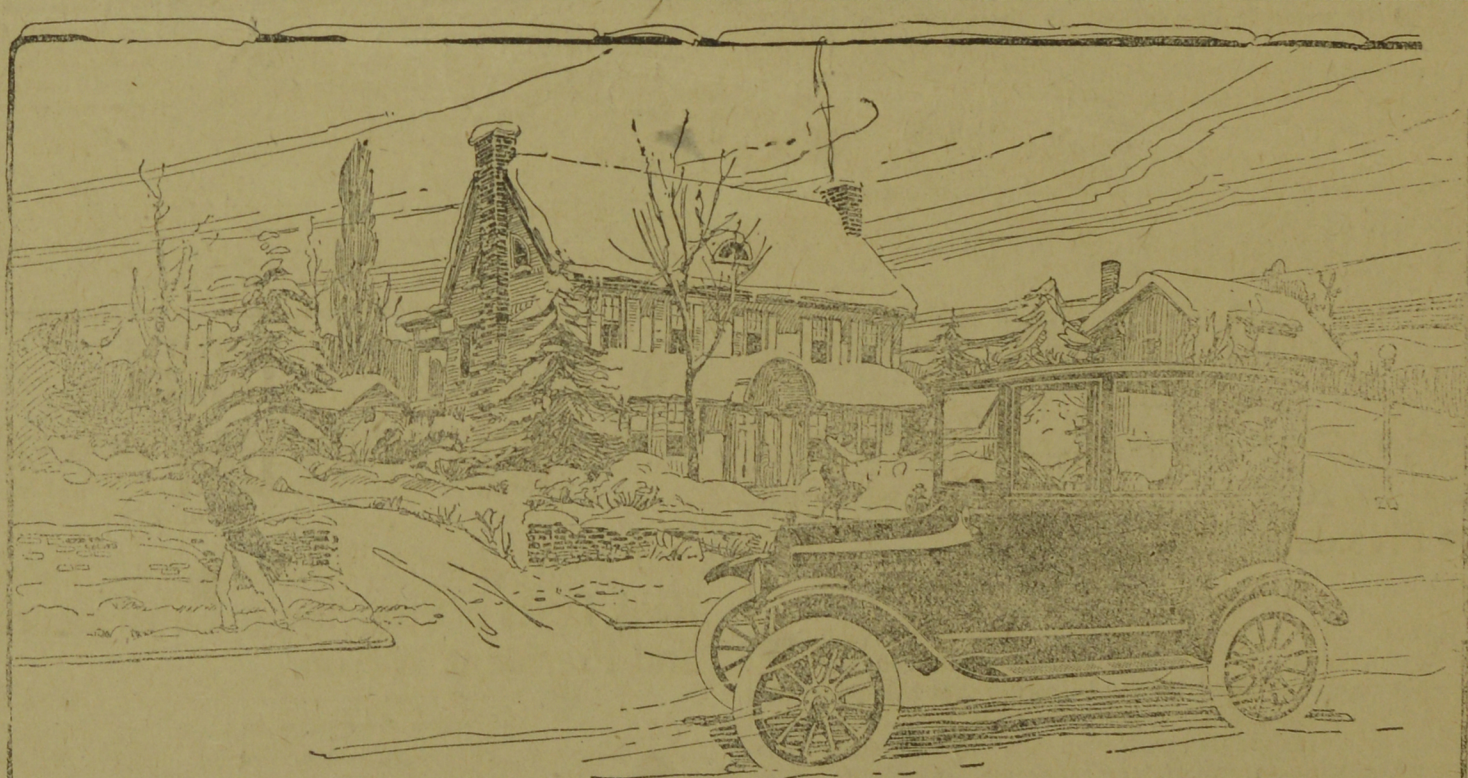
