HUNS ARE NOT SATISFIED WITH CHANCELLOR'S SPEECH

Some Newspapers Think He Should Have Been a Little More Precise--Differences Between the Chancellor's Statement and That of Count Czernin are Pointed Out --Signs That Huns Have an Unofficial Policy.

London Jan. 27. — The bulk of the press thus far received from Germany supports Count Von Hertling in his declaration of war aims, but some dissatisfaction is expressed that he was not more precise. Other newspapers note that difference between the statements of the imperial German chancellor and Count Czernin, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, in regard to negotiations with Russia. The Berlin Vossische Zeitung, according to an Amsterdam despatch to the Associated Press for example, says that Count Czernin's offer to the various Russian states of no annexations or indemnities shows that he considers the dismemberment of Russia has been accomplished whereas "we had always believed that Austria-Hungary, like Germany was negotiating with the Russians as a whole, or with the aggregate of its people. The absence of any reference to this situation by Count Von Hertling is a mistake, because the question of how we stand regarding peace in the east remains the foundation stone of a general peace."

Huns Disappointed.
The Munich Neueste Nachrichten, as quoted in advices from Zurich, Switzerland, complains that Von Hertling's speech failed to meet the expectations of the German public. His words cleared up certain points in regard to Germany's war aims, but full precision and clearness were absolutely necessary after the confused impressions left by the recent conferences in Berlin. "We recognize the outline, but nothing more, of the peace for which the administration has been striving," this newspaper declares. "But, alas, there are too many signs that beside this official German policy goes one unofficial."

Theodor Wolff, editor of the Berlin Tageblatt, writes that Count Czernin's suggestion of a joint discussion of peace terms by America and Austria undoubtedly was made in agreement with the Berlin government.

MOVEMENT FOR GENERAL STRIKE IN GERMANY

(Canadian Press direct wire.)
Amsterdam, Jan. 28.—According to reports printed in German newspapers concerning the meeting of the main committee of the Reichstag, secretary of the interior Wallraf, referring to a leaflet advocating a general strike, expressed strong hope that the German workers would not listen to such "an inexcusable call from irresponsible quarters." "If our enemies should succeed in smashing our home front," Herr Wallraf is quoted as saying, "all their rapacious crimes would revive, and the war would be prolonged indefinitely."

Herr Ledebour, independent socialist, replying to the speech of Dr. Von Kukschmann, the German foreign secretary, complained that a backward step had been taken, and that the government adhered completely to the views of the militarists. He said he considered the speech of Count Zernin, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, as a direct refutation of the words of the Count.
