The tillers of the soil are gardening on a large scale and expect big results. Although the recent frost did considerable damage, all crops promise to be excellent. Burtt's Corner contains a good hotel which is modern and very home-like.

Several of the citizens of this thriving little village own and operate their own cars and can be seen almost daily taking trips to or from Fredericton.

Mr. Elwood Burtt has a motor truck in which he takes passengers to Fredericton, making three trips a week. It is a delightful run down the Keswick Valley with a view of the beautiful Saint John River, the scenery of which is magnificent.
