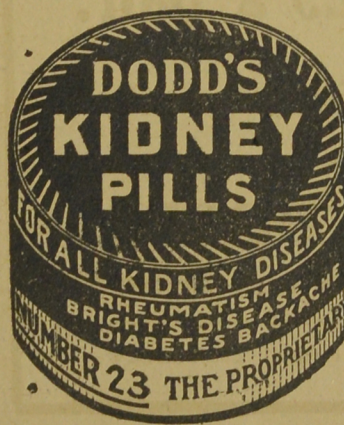

Taking Care of Your Peas.

Every amateur gardener is particularly proud when he manages to raise a good crop of peas. But this is not always the easiest thing in the world, for he has a virulent enemy in the shape of the pea aphid. This deceptive pest is pea green in color and is hard to detect. The aphids cluster on the growing tips and leaves and suck the strength out of the plants. They multiply quickly, and unless they are attended to as soon as they appear they are difficult to handle.

As soon as the aphids are discovered spray with nicotine sulphate—two tablespoonfuls to one gallon of water, with half an ounce of laundry or other soap dissolved in it. The spray must hit the aphids in order to be effective. In a few hours the aphids will die if the spray is going to kill them. After a few days spray again if any aphids are left.

Mildew is another destructive force among peas. It shows as a white coating over the leaves and pods, and it may ruin the crop. As soon as it appears, dust the plants with sulphur and repeat every few days as long as the disease remains.

Another remedy is to spray with Bordeaux mixture every ten days until the mildew disappears.

Public sentiment generally approves this method of dealing with offenders and it is expected to result in large additional enlistments in the near future.

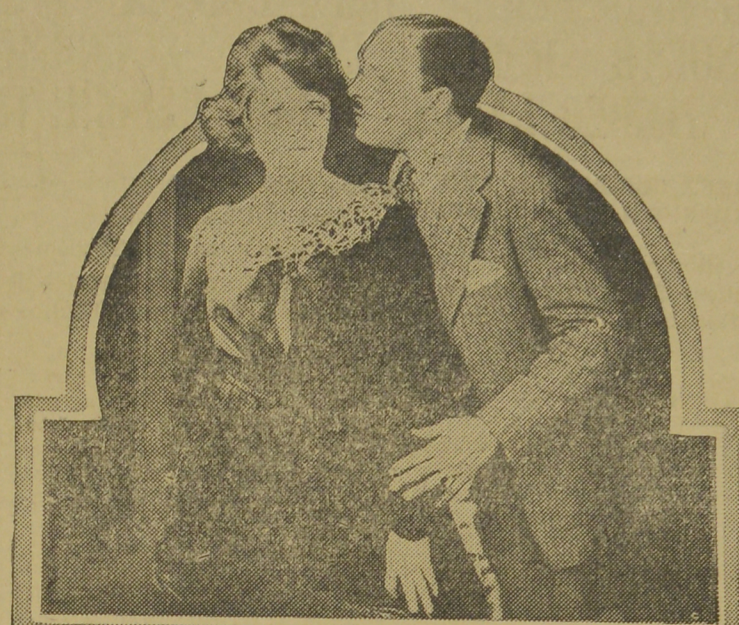
