

## BIG TRANSFER NORTH SHORE TIMBER LANDS

FRASER COMPANIES, LTD.  
BUY FROM JAS. ROBINSON

One Hundred and Twenty-six  
Miles of Crown Lands on  
Renous and Dungarvon  
—Record Price.

Another purchase of extensive timber tracts and milling property by Fraser Companies Limited is announced in Fredericton today. The property consists of one hundred and twenty six square miles of lands on the Dungarvon and Renous Rivers in Northumberland County and a saw mill at Newcastle which has been purchased from Mr. James Robinson, ex-M. P. of Millerton. The transfer was completed more than a week ago. The lands involved were held by Mr. Robinson under license from the Crown Land Department. The price is said to be the highest ever paid for lands of this kind.

### Large Amount Involved

The amount of money involved in the purchase by Fraser Companies Limited is variously estimated from \$100,000 to \$180,000. Mr. Robinson is in Fredericton today.

### Other Robinson Property

The transfer to the Fraser interests does not mean that Mr. Robinson is retiring from lumbering. He still owns a large mill on the Bartibogue River and extensive timber areas there. Fraser Companies Limited prior to this purchase owned large properties on the Miramichi. The most recent transfer will greatly increase the holdings of this company which is the most important lumber and pulp company in the Atlantic provinces holding timber areas and milling properties in Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

### Advisory Board Meeting

The train from Woodstock killed a cow on the C.P.R. line near Nashwaak last night. The train stopped to avoid hitting the animal but when it was again under headway the cow walked on the track the second time and was struck.

### Registered to Solemnize Marriages

Rev. George A. Grant of Blackville Presbyterian, Rev. F. J. M. Appleman of St. John, Disciples of Christ, and Rev. Luke Monroe Blackney of Windsor, Carleton County, Baptist, have been registered under provincial statutes to solemnize marriages in New Brunswick.

### Will Be Returned to Halifax

James Magee the young Halifax boy who has been in police custody here for some time probably will be sent back to Halifax shortly. The local authorities have communicated with the Halifax Relief Committee concerning him and he has been identified.

### Half a Million Feet

The quantity of lumber carried from the mill of Mr. Stanley Douglass at Stanley by the freshet within the past few days is now estimated at about half a million feet. This lumber will be sold by the owner to operators on the lower Nashwaak.

### To Close Sundays

The druggists of the city have decided to close their places of business on Sundays until further notice. Sunday is a day of rest and there does not seem to be any good reason why the druggists should not observe it as well as other business men. ## DEFENDANT APPEARED IN PERSON IN CASE OF GORMLEY VS. GORMLEY, NOW BEFORE THE DIVORCE COURT

Circumstances Most Unusual—Defendant Permitted to Take  
Seat in Chairs Used by Counsel and to Question Witnesses  
—Cruelty and Ill-Treatment Alleged by Plaintiff Wife—  
Parties formerly Resided in Fredericton—Decrees of Divorce Ordered in McMullin and Reid Cases.

There was an unusual development in the Divorce Court this morning when William Gormley of St. John, defendant in the suit of Mary Louise Gormley vs. William Gormley, appeared in person to defend the action. The had been listed in the docket as undefended and the appearance of the defendant caused complications. His Honor Judge Crocket asked the defendant if he intended to retain counsel and the reply was that the defendant was not in a position so to do but wished to make a statement concerning the circumstances which caused the trouble between himself and his wife. His Honor said that the circumstance was most unusual but that the defendant would be allowed to follow the case and question the witnesses upon the matters touched upon by the allegations of the plaintiff. Gormley took a seat in the outer row of seats used by counsel immediately behind Mr. Daniel Mullin, K. C. who appeared for the plaintiff. The defendant is a returned soldier having gone overseas with the 26th Battalion. He resided in Fredericton with the plaintiff some years ago.

In this case divorce "a mensa et thoro" is applied for. Mrs. Margaret Logan of St. John a witness of the marriage in 1897 gave evidence relative to the marriage. The plaintiff then took the stand and told of cruelty and ill-treatment on the part of her husband. The case was resumed this afternoon.

### McMullin Case

In the case of William F. Reid vs. William McMullin Mr. E. Albert Reilly appearing for the plaintiff a registered certificate of marriage was put in evidence. The witnesses heard were the plaintiff, Annie McCleave and the Deputy Provincial Secretary. His Honor decided that adultery with "Pearl" and with "Emily Niles" had been proven. A degree of divorce was granted.

### Reid Case

In the case of William F. Reid vs. Olivia Reid, Mr. N. Marks Mills appearing for the plaintiff, a returned soldier, evidence was given by the plaintiff, Dr. Joseph A. Wade, and the Deputy Provincial Secretary. The court decided that infidelity had been proven and a degree of divorce was granted.

### Tuesday Afternoon

In the divorce court Tuesday afternoon evidence was completed in the action of Eleanor Elizabeth Cunningham

ham vs. William Henry Cunningham. The witnesses were Private James Knox of the New Brunswick Depot Battalion, brother of the plaintiff's wife and R. W. L. Tibbits, Deputy Provincial Secretary. The brother's evidence was relative to the marriage and that of Mr. Tibbits relative to the officiating clergyman being duly authorized to solemnize marriages in this province. Court considers.

The case of John Mallory vs. Alberta Best Mallory followed, Kenneth A. Wilson of St. John appearing for the plaintiff. The latter went on the stand and Miss Cora Smith was the other witness. Infidelity was alleged and both witnesses gave evidence with regard to the evidence of the second witness being the more direct. Court considers.

No appearance being made in the case of Henry E. Allen vs. Florence M. Allen the case stands for the present.

The case of George Hetherington vs. Priscilla Hetherington was set for Thursday morning.

### At Foot of Docket

Mr. Francis Kerr made the same application in the case of Annie Gertrude Berton vs. James Berton that he made in the case of Louise Logan vs. Robert A. Logan, that the hearing take place in St. John on account of the plaintiff not being able to bear the financial burden of a trial at Fredericton. Both cases were put at the foot of the docket. His Honor Judge Crocket was not favorable to transferring the cases but will decide later.
