

FATAL AUTO ACCIDENT AT MONTREAL

Montreal, June 25.—Albert Jarvis night chief operator; Charles Jennings, assistant chief operator of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company's Telegraph here, and an unknown woman are dead as the result of an automobile accident which occurred early this morning on Park Avenue.

There were five persons in the car at the time of the accident. The others escaped with slight cuts and other minor injuries.

According to the story told to the police by one of the injured, the car was proceeding along Park Avenue at a fair rate of speed when the machine skidded and crashed into a telegraph pole, the occupants of the machine being thrown to the pavement.

The chauffeur of the car is Archibald O. Patterson, who was driving his employer's car. He claimed that he did not know the names of the victims. They had joined his party during the evening. Jarvis and Jennings had left the C. P. R. Telegraph offices at one o'clock, after concluding their night's work, and are supposed to have been offered a ride home by the driver of the automobile. A. C. Proper, who left work at the same time, and who rode home on a Park Avenue car, saw the crowd at the scene of the accident, got off and recognized the bodies as those of his two associates.

BOOTS FROM SHARK SKINS

A recent article in the Journal of Industrial and Engineering Chemistry of the American Chemical Society tells us of new possibilities for obtaining the much needed substitutes for shoe leather.

The present scarcity of leather is an obvious and necessary result of the war, for leather is an animal product and is, therefore, affected by the same conditions that have led to the scarcity and high price of meat. In our own country we have not yet been driven to such extremities as in the European countries, but the price of leather and footwear has risen enormously, and we are diligently seeking both leather substitutes and new sources of supply. The skins of aquatic animals offer a practically undeveloped resource, and it is not unlikely that before long we shall be covering our extremities with the skins of the man-eating shark and the sacred cod-fish.

Recent experiments at Pratt Institute, Brooklyn, have demonstrated that a marketable leather can be obtained from this source. The reason we have not heretofore utilized the skins of aquatic animals for leather is not because they are not perfectly well adapted for such use but only because the skins of land animals have been so plentiful. The shoes made from shark skins cannot be distinguished from those made of other leathers and the wearing qualities seem to be superior.

Since there is no question of the excellence of aquatic leather it is not likely that there will be a considerable development of this source of supply. The Bureau of Fisheries has been experimenting with these skins and reports that already several companies are in the market for the raw hides of sharks and porpoises.
