NO IDLENESS IN KENTUCKY

Frankfort, Ky., June 22.—No able-bodied male residents of Kentucky between the ages of 16 and 60 may loaf until six months after peace is declared. He must, according to a bill passed at a recent session of the Legislature, work for at least 36 hours a week. Otherwise he shall be held as a vagrant and fined not less than \$20 nor more than \$100 for each offence.

WATER GLASS METHOD BEST FOR PRESERVATION OF EGGS

Eggs Should Now be Laid Down for the Winter Months When Prices Will be High --- Method of Preparing the Water Glass---Only Strictly Fresh Eggs Should Be Used

Many methods are used for preserving eggs during the season of low production. Some methods are most satisfactory reasons are not at all so.

The secret of successful artificial preservation lies in obtaining satisfactory eggs. Infertile eggs only should be used. To obtain infertile eggs it is necessary to dispose of the male bird. Use only clean eggs—not eggs which have been washed. Shells must be strong and free from checks or cracks. Eggs should be absolutely new-laid.

Water-Glass Method

Water glass is the trade name for a substance known chemically as Sodium Silicite. It is of a dirty white color. In consistency it is usually semi-liquid or liquid depending upon its purity and the temperature under which it is kept although it is frequently available in powder form. It may usually be obtained from the druggists.

Stone or earthenware crocks are most satisfactory receptacles, though wooden vessels, if made of odorless wood, may be used. They should be soaked in clean water before using. It is usually possible to preserve about three dozen eggs per gallon capacity of the crock i. e. a five gallon crock will hold about fifteen dozen eggs. Eggs occupy about one-half the space

in the receptacle—the liquid the other half. If the water glass is diluted with water 1 part to 9 parts by bulk, 1 quart of water glass would make 10 quarts or 2.5 gallons of preserving fluid, sufficient for the 15 dozen eggs.

To prepare, put into the receptacle the desired amount of water glass and add to it 9 times the same amount of water which has been previously boiled and cooled. Put a new laid egg into the liquid. If it rises to or near the top add more water and stir until the egg sinks to or near the bottom. The liquid is then of about the proper consistency. The eggs may be placed into it as gathered, not necessarily all at once. If more convenient the eggs may be placed in the receptacle, the liquid mixed in a separate vessel and poured over them. The disadvantage in this is that if the liquid is found to be too dense diluting it is difficult after it is poured over the eggs. The eggs should be covered by about an inch of the liquid to prevent exposure in case some evaporation takes place. It is well to pour a few drops of sweet or olive oil on the liquid and stir slightly. This forms a film over the surface and retards evaporation. The vessel should be covered as closely as possible by a lid and should be kept in a cool place.

The foregoing preservative is very effective. Eggs have been kept perfectly edible in it for at least two

years. The length of time possible to keep them has not been determined.

Lime Water Method

This method though used less frequently than the water glass is very satisfactory. It consists in slaking in water a very small amount of lime, adding excess water and stirring. After the lime settles pour off the lime water at the top. This is the preservative. More water may be added to the lime, stirring continued and more preservative thus obtained. This may be continued indefinitely. Lime is practically insoluble in water and the amount used consequently negligible, and the cost practically nil.

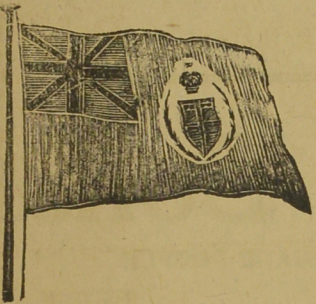
This method is occasionally criticized in that the eggs are said to have a limy flavor and rather hard yolks but the preservation is effective.

Packing in bran, chaff, etc.

These methods are not to be recommended. They do not actually preserve and if the packing material becomes moist, which is likely to occur, decomposition and not preservation almost invariably occurs.
